W. J. Stone Republicanism

Though not feeling well enough to take part in the feast of Silence to which a thousand Missouri Democrats lent their physical presence and compulsory voicelessness Senator Stone is making a series of speeches this week in the Sixth Missouri District, where a congressional election to fill a vacancy will be held February 1. Senator Stone addresses a considerable part of his argument to what he calls Progressive Republicans, a term he applies to those who, as soon as elected to office by Republican votes, proceed to kick out of traces and act as assistant Democrats. The senator does not claim to be a progressive Democrat. He stands pat on his party record and in nowise disclaim any phase of it. But he bails progressiveness in a Republican and cherishes the hope that the progress will continue until the convert reaches the Nirvana of political superiority that has always distinguished the Stone Democrats of Missouri in the senator's opinion. If the Progressive falls short of this high goal, what remains for him but to be condemned into everlasting redemption, in the language of Dogberry.

Senator Stone is right in saying that if Mr. Griffith, the Republican nominee in the Sixth District, is elected to the House he will act with the majority and respect the rules that enable it to transact business. Beyond the slightest doubt, as Senator Stone declares, Mr. Griffith would be for a protective tariff in full accord with the national platform of the party. Therefore, the senator extends the welcoming hand to such new-light Republicans as he is able to approve and urges them to vote for Mr. Griffith's opponent, whose Democracy is warranted to be unprogressive in everything connected with the strictest party regularity. If the Democrat is elected he will, as Stone promises, "help Champ Clark out Cannon from power," which would certainly be getting there as a typical Democrat, old style, and not merely testing the aeroplane with the aid of progressive Republicans. As for the Cannon rules, they are mild compared with the gag applied by the new-fangled Committee of Address at the Democratic State Conference at Kansas City last week. Senator Stone, for some reason, did not stretch a point to be there. He is a shrewd old Bourbon. His offer to be a Republican guide in Missouri is comical.—St. Louis Daily Globe Democrat.

The first school visited this week was a Seifers, in Pleasant Gap township. The teacher here wanted some advice concerning her work and that is only an indication that she is trying to do good work. At Rich Valley the teacher had written for information concerning how she should finish up her work for the next teacher. This teacher, Miss Mamie Culver, takes the right view of her work and begins to plan before it is too late. She is one of our best teachers and her pupils work with a will.

Over at Reynard they are having a good school on the part of both teacher and pupils. The board has employed Prof. Conrad to continue the school without a vacation. This is the only school house in the county built of stone. It is one of the best arranged and most comfortable. They are arranging for a lecture by Prof. G. A. Theilman of Appleton City the proceeds to go to the library fund.

Up at Pleasant Gap school they are doing good work as usual. The teacher and pupils had a very nice tree here Christmas and the pupils showed their appreciation for what the teacher is doing for them by giving her a present that anyone might well feel proud of. Miss Myrtle Burch is teacher and takes good interest in all work relating to the profession. She has not missed a reading circle or teachers meeting of any kind for two years.

At Brackney they have a good attendance and a good interest among the pupils. They have sent in all work left for them to do except a few sentences which we understand they have ready. They recently had a pie supper here and made a nice little sum to use on their library. Miss Lottie Young is teacher and is making a special effort for the library offered by the merchants.

Up at Miller they are having a good school taught by Mrs. C. C. Lyle of Butler. They recently had a pie supper and used the proceeds for a new stove which they needed. Mrs. Lyle contemplates going to Colorado in the Spring and in this we will lose one of our best teachers. The pupils of this school are exceptionally good workers.

Patty school has a very small enrollment but a good attendance and but few tardy marks. This school had a pie supper and bought a new teacher's desk and chair that would be a credit to any school and now they have ordered a new slate blackboard with the remainder of the proceeds. Miss Carrie Palm is teacher and is doing good work.

Over at Summit Center they have an enrollment of twenty-three with a good average attendance. This is one school house that is too large requiring too long a time to warm the room. Miss Stella Dale is teacher and is giving the best of satisfaction. She has been teaching in Cass county until this year. Her work is up with the course of study in every particular.

Over at Valley the attendance was very light on account of the weather and we will visit this school again soon.

Over at Cherry Grove they have a good enrollment and a good attendance with the pupils taking good interest. They had several questions to ask on various subjects and were willing to try any test. Miss Mattie Harshaw is teacher and those interested say they are having the best school for several years.

At Willow Tree the attendance was very light on this particular day but is usually very good. This school will have some rural graduates. Miss Nanna Gilliland

is teacher and has her pupils doing good work.

Down at Oak Grove they have a very nice school room and the best arrangement for ventilation of any country school in the county in the county. This school had a large enrollment of pupils in the first three years work and as a result the attendance is not as good as many schools. The papers on literature taken up in this school are the best received and this school is doing extra on nature study. The board has employed Miss Lawson to teach the next term of school which is sufficient evidence that her work is satisfactory.

Up at Adrian every thing is moving about as usual but only three of the eight rooms were visited; another day will be spent in this school in the future. The board here has placed the first and second grades under two teachers and are getting excellent results. Miss Ella Shelton is one of our best primary teachers and has a very quiet orderly room. Miss Maud Morgan has been elected to take the place held by Mrs. C. C. Woods and her work is moving very nicely. This school has the largest reading circle in the county and never has a member been absent.
