Morgan Circuit Court. The case of the State against Jao. L. Williams, charged in the indictment for killing John Reed near Florence, in 1875, was called up last Thursday afternoon, after the evidence being added for the State and defense.

Mr. D. E. Wray, on the part of the State, addressed the jury in a two hour and a half speech, making an able argument and a telling appeal. He was followed by Hon. A. W. Anthony, who spoke over four hours in defense of the prisoner, and through his speech and convincing argument certainly succeeded in reducing the punishment of his client much lower than the public expected it would be.

Mr. E. F. Walker, Prosecuting Attorney, closed the case, and in three hours speech presented the case on behalf of the State in a clear and able manner. The attorneys in the case did well, and surely their respective clients must be satisfied with the excellent work of their attorneys.

The case was given the jury Saturday night about 11 o'clock, and on Sunday afternoon the jury announced to the Sheriff that they had arrived at a verdict. Court was soon opened, and the following verdict rendered by the jury was read by the Clerk:

"We, the jury, find the defendant, John L. Williams, guilty of manslaughter in the second degree, as set out in the second count of the indictment, and assess his punishment in the penitentiary for a term of three years."

Sentence was then passed on the prisoner in accordance with the verdict of the jury and the defendant counsel gave notice that he would file an affidavit for appeal, and for a stay of execution to-day.

Two prominent lawyers in the case. The one was given, and a little boxing, not the most scientific, indulged in, when they were separated and fined \$50 each by the Court.—Versailles Gazette.
