## All Over the State.

### A Tragedy in Dent County.

Salem—Telephone messages received here from the eastern part of Dent county report a tragedy in which one man, James H. Berry, lost his life, and another, Samuel Ogle, was severely wounded. Berry, who had for many years owned the farm and resided where he was killed, about a year ago sold part of his farm to Ogle. Details are confined to Mrs. Berry's statement. She says that about 6 a. m. Berry went into the garden to gather some potatoes for breakfast, and when he had been gone only a few moments she heard three shots from the direction of the garden, but saw no one. When she reached the garden she found Berry lifeless and no assailant in sight. Ogle was later found to be badly wounded.

### Revival at Sullivan.

Sullivan—Rev. Charles Reign Scoville, a noted revivalist, is holding a meeting here. A tabernacle 75x100 feet has been erected, with a seating capacity of 2,000. Every evening all available space has been occupied, and a number of times crowds collected on the outside. People come a distance of 60 and 75 miles to hear him, many remaining in the city to attend the services. Two hundred were added to the church in five nights.

### Alleges Bad Bookkeeping.

Kansas City—An investigation at the Kansas City post office, which has been in progress for the past two weeks by nine inspectors sent here from Washington, has brought to light a shortage of \$2,759.77 in the accounts of an employe. The shortage has been made good by Postmaster Harris. The discrepancy arose, he says, from bad bookkeeping.

### Recluse Dies From Lockjaw.

Cape Girardeau—Pat Scott, 70, a recluse, died at a hospital. His death was caused by lockjaw. He was an inveterate morphine user, and filthy needles, used to inject the opiate, are believed to have started the tetanus. Scott was a war-time merchant of St. Louis, and later a contractor on the Iron Mountain railway when built. He lived in a hut on the banks of the Mississippi.

### Minister's Wedding a Surprise.

Cameron—The marriage of Rev. Edward Wallace Walte to his organist, Miss Nellie Grant, first became known through a St. Louis paper, and caused no little surprise. Mrs. Walte is the daughter of J. W. Grant, a traveling salesman of this city. Rev. Mr. Walte's first wife had been an invalid 20 years, and died about two months ago.

### What Springfield Normal Wants.

Springfield—The net general assembly will be asked to appropriate not less than \$300,000 for the erection and equipment of buildings for the new state normal school located here by the last legislature.

### Blind Veteran Dies From Falls.

Cape Girardeau—After falling into a cistern twice in as many days, Henry Koch, a wealthy brick manufacturer of this city, died of the shock. A veteran of the civil war, he became blind a month ago.

### Died on Her Wedding Anniversary.

St. Louis—Mrs. Etta Anderson Lucecock, wife of Rev. Nathaniel Lucecock, died on the nineteenth anniversary of their wedding. Bishop Fitzgerald preached the funeral sermon.

### Storing Ozark Apples.

Springfield—Sixty thousand barrels of Ozark apples will be stored at Springfield, to be held until prices advance. Another train load will be shipped to Europe.

### Repented of Her Act.

St. Louis—Because her husband compared her with other women, Mrs. Mary Sommers, 22, drank carbolic acid, and screamed for help. Sent to the hospital.

### Gets Cincinnati's Prettiest Girl.

Cincinnati, O.—Miss Nan Pullen, daughter of Richard Pullen, said to be the prettiest girl in Cincinnati, is engaged to George B. Longstreet, St. Louis.

### Heir to Vast German Estate.

Kirkwood—Leo E. Hintzelmann, a Kirkwood grocer. It is reported, becomes heir to vast German estate on death of uncle.

### No Stock in "Unwritten Law."

St. Louis—The grand jury has returned two indictments against Patrolman McNamara, who killed his wife and paramour.

St. Louis—Statistics furnished by Secretary Morgan of the Merchants' exchange, indicate next year's railroad tonnage will be enormous.


### Scorpions Cause Disaster.


