### OBITUARY.

Rev. S. A. Hall was born at St. Pere, Canada, May 29th, 1823, and died at his home, Windsor, Mo., Sunday, March 19, 1911, at the age of nearly eighty-eight years. When a child, with his parents he came to the state of New York. He was educated at Malone Institute, Malton, N. Y., and at the age of twenty five, was ordained a minister in the Methodist church.

In 1872 he was married, in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, to Miss Emma Tondro. Five children were born to this union, Alta being the only survivor. The family came to Boone county in 1887, remaining twenty years. In 1907 the family took the son, George, to Eureka Springs in hopes to improve his health, but his death occurred just three years previous to that of his father.

Deceased is survived by his wife, daughter, one brother, George Hall, of Nevada, Ia., and two sisters in Ottawa, Ill. The burial was at Eureka Springs, beside the son, George. Alta, a former teacher in the Boone School, holds a position in the Windsor high school and lives with the mother.—Ex.

Our citizens will remember Mr. Hall, who was a citizen of Versailles for some time, while Miss Alta was a teacher in the Versailles High School.
