For Good Roads.

Jefferson City, July 8—Governor Major said today that he would issue a proclamation shortly setting apart two days in August when every able bodied resident in the rural districts and towns of the state will be asked to render personal assistance in improving the highways.

The governor estimates that at least three hundred thousand men will respond and put in two days of hard work on the public roads. Many persons, too, he says, will furnish teams and machinery.

"The work of three hundred thousand earnest men for two days will be equivalent to six hundred thousand days' work, to say nothing of the teams that will be supplied. Many boys, too, will turn out and aid the good cause. The smaller cities can, and no doubt will, aid this work."

The governor said he desired to give ample notice to the end that the local authorities in every community can be prepared to handle the great number of volunteer road workers to the best possible advantage.

Governor Major himself proposes to wield a pick and shovel for the two days on some highway near Jefferson City, and he will expect every state official to do the same. Kansas City Star.
