Woman Suffrage Notes

(PRESS BULLETINS)

The Resolution Committee of the National Educational Association has approved women suffrage and equal pay for teachers. This is in line with the advice of President Swain of Swarthmore College, who in a recent address said, "Let women teachers vote."

Flowery speech-making suffered a jolt when Hon. William S. Humphrey of Washington, criticised Hon. "Tom" Heflin of Alabama, for the latter's stand against woman suffrage. After describing Mr. Heflin's speech as "rich to redundancy, magnificent in inflated pomposity, and unmarred by a thought," Mr. Humphrey said, "I cannot conceive how it is possible for a mentality that thinks that the great tide of woman suffrage can be turned by stilted oratory to believe that the hand that rocks the cradle will pollute the ballot box."

Anti-Suffragists boastfully claim 90 per cent of women do not want to vote, but when they attempted to organize in St. Louis, they found difficulty in sustaining the boast. They were unable to effect an organization and the few opponents of "Votes for Women" acknowledged failure to stem the overwhelming suffrage sentiment for woman suffrage in Missouri. The question will be voted on in November where it is confidently expected that Missouri women will obtain the ballot, making the eleventh state in which women have equal political opportunities with men of the state.

BY REQUEST OF THE LADIES.

This paper is publishing from time to time short articles on Woman Suffrage, not because we are fighting for it, but because the women of the Southern States Woman Suffrage Conference requested us to do this. We do most anything the women tell us to do and when a majority of the Southern women want suffrage, the men are going to give them that. God bless the women. They would improve politics, for everybody knows anything is better with women in it. —Lafayette County Press.

The nod of a peasant's head is said to have misled Napoleon and caused his defeat at Waterloo. The tweak of a coat-tail defeated a favorable committee report on the Georgia Woman Suffrage bill. The measure was discussed for nearly three hours in the committee, and the vote was a tie. The Chairman indicated by his questions during the discussion that he was on the fence and clearly undecided. One of the opponents of the bill who led the fight, jerked the coat tail of the Chairman and whispered to him, and in evident obedience to the jerk and the whisper, up went the hand of the irresolute chairman and the bill was lost by this one vote. However, Georgia women mean to press the measure for a debate on the floor of the House.
