

### SENATORS LOSE BY 4 TO 3 SCORE

In a 10-inning game the Sheridan baseball team defeated the Salem Senators by a score of 4 to 3 at Oxford park yesterday afternoon.

A pitiful error made by Johnnie Humphreys in the first half of the tenth cost the Senators their chance and let in the winning score. Johnnie let a nice little grounder roll peacefully between his legs, repeated the performance two minutes later and got Sage in a bad hole. It was a matter of over-confidence on the part of the Salem player.

Scoring started in the second inning when Sage, pitching for Salem, allowed two walks and three hits. Humphreys made an error, Sheridan scoring three. In the second half of the same inning, Lauterback got a hit, Girod managed to land on first through an error of the Sheridan shortstop, and Sage, getting a single brought in the runners. In the fourth inning Salem tied the score, Gill reaching first on a single and taking the homeward trail on an error of the Sheridan left fielder.

The fifth inning should have meant victory for the Senators for Hayes reached third on a single and two stolen bases. Laterback got a walk. The next three batters, however, went out in one-two-three order.

Sage pitched a good game allowing only four hits, while Myers, the opposing moundsman, suffered 10, and would have won his game if he had been given respectable support from the infield.
