

From the Cape of Good Hope. By the arrival of the bark Arthur Pickering at Boston, on the 31st ult., we have advices to the 15th July, from the Cape of Good Hope. The vessel which sailed from Bermuda some time since, with the exiled Irish patriot John Mitchell, on board, had not arrived at the Cape when the Arthur Pickering left, but was hourly expected. The greatest excitement continued to prevail in consequence of the determination of the home government to settle convicts in the colony. Several government officers had resigned; and those who accepted their places were attacked by the people, and the houses of some were destroyed. The military were called out, and several persons wounded, before the rioters dispersed. It was thought that on the arrival of the convict vessel serious disturbances would occur. The Arthur Pickering brought six lions, and one tiger.

COMMERCIAL. FERRIS OFFICE, 1849. Lower Sandusky, O., Sept. 14, 1849. Since our last publication what has declined somewhat from the prices then stated, which has considerably diminished the receipts. For the last four or five days, buyers have been paying no more than 75 to 80 cents for a first rate article. There is no reason why wheat should continue at prices which have been paid for the last two or three weeks. Buyers in Buffalo are holding off refusing to pay over 86 cents, and the tendency is still downward. Our market can be quoted now at 73 to 75 cents for the best quality. There is no more flour made here now than will answer for home consumption, price is steady at \$5.00. The principal reason that there is a less amount of wheat coming forward now, the farmers are busily engaged in getting in their fall crops, and as soon as it is completed there will be a large amount daily arriving. Corn and Oats sold as heretofore reported; the former at 38 to 40 cents, and the latter 20 to 22 cents.
