

Important Correspondence.

That the people of Ohio may see the spirit that actuates the two parties at the capitol of their State, we give the letter from the Whig Senators to the Lookout, respecting the organization of the Senate, with their reply. We ask for them a careful perusal.

1. We will meet with you on the 3d instant, in the Senate Chamber, at 10 o'clock A. M., that being the usual hour for the meeting of both branches of the Legislature, and then there proceed to the organization of the Senate in the following manner:

2d. Immediately after said Senators elect (Messrs. Johnson and Broadwell, excepted as aforesaid,) shall be sworn into office, there shall be elected a temporary Speaker, Clerk, and Sergeant-at-arms, who shall hold their offices respectively until a permanent organization be had as hereinafter provided.

3d. The temporary Speaker shall appoint a committee on Privileges and Elections, consisting of three Senators, to whom the credentials of Messrs. Broadwell and Johnson shall be referred for examination.

4th. Said committee shall, at the earliest practicable moment, report to the Senate the results of its examination of said credentials, and the Senate shall then determine by vote, (neither Johnson nor Broadwell voting) whether the said Broadwell or Johnson is legally entitled to a seat in the Senate, and said vote shall be final in the premises.

5th. The said Johnson or Broadwell, according as the one or the other may be declared by the majority vote as last aforesaid to be entitled to his seat in the Senate, shall immediately after said vote be sworn into office.

6th. The Senate shall then proceed to its permanent organization, by the election of a Speaker, Clerk and Sergeant-at-arms, to serve during the session.

7th. Until such permanent organization shall be perfected as in manner aforesaid, neither Johnson nor Broadwell to exercise any rights or privileges belonging to Senators, nor the Senate to transact any business, save adjourning from day to day, except as is hereinafter provided.

Colombus, Dec. 1849.

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, Senators holding over and Senators elect, have received your communication of this date, containing a series of propositions for the organization of the Senate, which has been considered. While we are desirous of harmony, we cannot agree to any proposition which in our judgment involves any sacrifice of the constitutional rights and duties of the people or of the Senate.

The ground on which we stand is taken deliberately, and based as we believe, on constitutional right, and the true sovereignty of the people. We have no objection to the time proposed for meeting; but the residue of your propositions are based upon an assumption in which we cannot agree. The only evidence we have or can have, that a person is entitled to a seat on the opening of the body is a certificate of election signed by the proper officer. If, after, on this evidence, he has taken his seat, either the validity of the certificate, or of his election be questioned, that will be settled by the decision of the Senate. We insist then, distinctly and shall claim, that the regular and usual course be pursued, and that all persons presenting certificates of election signed by the proper officer, must be sworn in at the preliminary organization. Union of Central America. Correspondence of the New York Tribune. Leon de Nicaragua, Nov. 9, 1849. Dear Greely: I have only time to say that the Commissioners of Nicaragua, San Labrador and Honduras have just signed the articles of confederation between those states, which are to be brought under a General Government with all possible despatch. The greatest enthusiasm prevail in consequence. Castamela and Gosto Rica are to be formally invited to come in; but their actual Governments are under British influence, and may decline. But the People are for it, and these States, sooner or later, will unite with the Three of the Center. "Rediviva" is to be the motto of the new Republic of Central America. The prospective Canal, the hopes of closer connection with the United States, and the infant but increasing trade with California, destined to become of great value have roused the People from their despondency, revived their patriotism, and given new life to industry. The only cause of apprehension for the future are the proceedings of the English in the Bay of Fonseca. Yours, &c., A. B.
