Discusses Local Matters.

Baron de Rothsbang Von Dolberg, a relative of Lieut Cooke, is on his way to San Pedro from New York. He is interested in mining and comes here for that purpose.

The smelter is running one stack. Preparations are going forward for the construction of another. They are employing nearly twenty hands and doobie that number will soon be put on.

There were, previous to the storm which is still unabated, nearly an hundred hands employed in and about the mine and, under the able management of Supt. Kuhn, something like 80 tons of ore per day were being extracted.

In no camp in the west have I encountered as gentlemanly a set of miners, as can be found in this town. Ever ready to lend a helping hand to the unfortunate; always cheerful and smiling, they go about their work whistling and singing, and keeping up a weirdly awful accompaniment to the tune with the hammer and the drill.

The recent deep snows, have become such a nuisance that all the laborers were laid off three days ago pending the removal of the ore now on the dump and the resumption of hauling. The ore house is full and the mine itself is fast becoming blocked with mineral ready to be sorted. The camp will be a good one this winter without doubt, but better accommodations for the miners should be put up by the company, as there is more than a little suffering among them caused by the exposure to which they are subjected through lack of warm and comfortable quarters.
