Finer specimens of ores are now being dug up around Cerrillos than ever before. The prospecting fever seems to be breaking out in good shape.

Santa Fe people cheer the enterprise of Cerrillos in getting its incorporation papers filed so quickly. A plat has already been made of the new town.

No Cerrillos coal should be sold for less than three dollars on cars here, yet if reports are true, it has been sold under two dollars—less than it can be produced for.

Hans Larson has a very large and handsome nugget which he found on one of his claims in the Ortiz district two weeks ago. It is pure six placer gold, and will weigh \$5 to \$10.

The Cash Entry is now capable of turning out a car load of concentrates a day, worth \$3,000. This multiplied by 365, the number of days in the year, gives the neat sum of \$1,095,000.

There are great mother veins of gold and placers capable of yielding many millions of dollars, in southern Santa Fe county. All that is required to get it out is capital and properly directed effort.

It is reported that the Hart family, four of whom are just recovered from small pox and the head of the family now sick, are in need of the necessaries of life. This matter should be attended to at once by our people.

Mr. Geo. R. Bailey is now manager of the Cerrillos branch clothing house of J. H. Gerdes. Bailey and Probst will make a good team. The house will hereafter sell very cheap for cash, and sell for cash only.

Judge Downs of Santa Fe, remarks: "I am betting on Southern Santa Fe County, and that is what keeps me in this country." The Judge regards our resources as practically unlimited, and has confidence in their early development.

Santa Fe will very soon be lighted with electric lights. The post and wires are now being put up. This stroke of enterprise is largely due to the efforts of C. F. A. Fischer and John D. Allen, who have worked hard to engineer the plant to a success.

The petition to incorporate Cerrillos was signed in a hurry by the required majority of voters and was on Monday taken to Santa Fe by Toney Neis and presented to the board of county commissioners. So far it looks as if there would be little or no voice against incorporation here.

A nice little repast will be served, consisting of cake, lemonade and other delicate dishes, and the best effort will be exercised to make it a pleasing social. Everybody invited.

S. P. Conger was in from the San Lazarus Monday. He had with him a retort of 39 ounces of gold from a small mill run. He states that the well furnishes plenty of water for the one Huntington mill. The cleanups so far average about \$125 per day. He also states that extra rich and extensive ore bodies have shown up in the mine, within the past week.

The second annual meeting of the Gentlemen's Driving association of Albuquerque, will be held at the fair grounds in that city on April 30, and May 1 and 2. Purse for the first day range from \$100 to \$250, to be competed for by green trotters, novelty running race of one mile, and trotting, 237 class. Second day—purses ranging from \$200 down to \$150, for trotters, 245 and 300 classes, and half mile and mile running heats.

Third day—Purses of from \$400 down to \$100, trotting, free to all; double team, and three-quarters of a mile running heats. The horse trotting in the fastest time, provided it be better than 2:30, will receive \$100.

There are hundreds of claims in a distance of from half a mile to twenty miles of Cerrillos that would hail the building of a smelter at this place as the beginning of prosperity. The owners of these claims could then take out sufficient ore worth \$15 to \$30 and upwards, a ton, to enable them to keep right along working and developing their properties, and among so large a number of prospects, doubtless a fair number of rich mines would result. These claims at present could produce all the way from a few hundred pounds to hundreds of tons of ore, which although not rich enough to stand freight, treatment and robbery charges at the eastern smelters, could be delivered to reduction works at home and would return good wages to the prospector and miner for taking it out and thus enable him to constantly improve his property and make a living out of it. When it is taken into consideration that Cerrillos offers the best and cheapest location for smelting that can be found anywhere, on account of fuel, iron and all fluxes at the door, and at the same time in the midst of one of the most thoroughly mineralized sections on the globe, it does seem that it should not much longer go begging for such a plant. It would be an assured success with proper business management. The bane of such enterprises in the southwest heretofore has been in this lack. They have been put in the hands of some one who grossly neglected all trusts and managed them on a system of business that would sink the National treasury. A good smelting plant at Cerrillos, with decent business management, would prove a bonanza to its owners and a god-send to all the mining interests around us.
