NOVEL USE OF SHEEP.

Put in Battle Ship Turrets to Test Shock of Heavy Guns.

The new battle ship Henry IV, has just been subjected to a six hours' trial, which has given satisfactory results, says a Paris cable dispatch to the Cincinnati Commercial Tribune.

During the trials the ship's heavy artillery was tested, and in order to discover what the effect on the vessel would be when the fore turret gun was fired sheep were placed at the posts which in action would be occupied by those serving the smaller guns over which the big turret gun fires.

After the discharge the commission examined the sheep, which were found to be stunned, but otherwise unharmed. It was therefore concluded that as men have a greater power of resistance than sheep the gunners in the turret would suffer no serious harm through the firing of the guns.

Berlin, June 8.—The first city in Germany to grant women active participation in municipal administration is Offenbourg, grand duchy of Baden, where eight lady supervisors have been appointed.
