Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

The judges of Supreme Court will assemble at Montpelier next Monday evening. They will sit in chambers until Thursday morning, July 30, when they will go to render decisions on several cases already heard.

Eight months ago while blacksmith Edward Jackson, Troop B, 2nd Cav., Fort Ethan Allen, was shoeing a horse, three pieces of hot steel flew into his right eye. He was treated at the post hospital, two operations being performed, the last one July 14. The operations were unsuccessful as he has entirely lost the sight of his eye.
