While the trend of liquor legislation in the eastern part of this country has been entirely in the direction of license it is interesting to note that the prohibitionists are sweeping everything before them in Texas. Already they have captured two-thirds of the counties, and they have now transferred their activities to the remaining ones.

Secretary Root maintains that the United States government has a right to the services of the young men whom it has trained and educated at considerable expense, at least for a reasonable length of time. This assertion on the part of Secretary Root was made when the resignations of three young artillery lieutenants were refused. It appears right that the government should have some claim on the services of those it has trained.

The all-absorbing matter of interest to the Catholic world, and to the whole world, in fact, was settled today in the election of Cardinal Sarto as pope to succeed the late Leo XIII. Ever since the death of the latter and, indeed, long before that event, the succession was a matter of so much consequence that, in the nature of events, it had to be considered. In the election to the head of the church, completed today, a man has been chosen who was in many respects like his immediate predecessor, although, perhaps, lacking somewhat the reserve force which characterized Leo. In other respects Sarto is much like Leo. Very popular with his immediate diocese, he is also noted for the purity of his life and his uprightness. And, too, he is a man of liberal ideas, possessing a strong mind and one well trained by study. What the policy of his papacy will be it is of course difficult to predict, but it is certain among those well acquainted with him, that it will be one of liberality.

Some Republican leaders in Louisiana have taken upon themselves the work of trying to rend the party in that state, that is, the white section of the party. The lever which they are using is, as was to be expected, President Roosevelt's position in relation to the Negro. A circular letter which the Insurrectionists have sent out to the white members of the Republican party of that state calls for an abandonment of the party because a "white man cannot belong to it" on account of its interest in the black race. The circular then proceeds to attack the man who will be the party nominee at the next election, Roosevelt, and says he is stamped "either as a Negrophile fanatic, whose views are repugnant to every free-born American, and a deadly insult to every Southern-born man, or as a demagogue politician playing for the Negro vote that holds the balance of power in Ohio, Indiana and New York." That is a fair sample of the rest of the circular. But the whole is so intemperate in speech that no one outside possibly a few whites in Louisiana will fail to see through it. The circular even goes so far as to attempt to make capital out of the present lynching epidemic, claiming that that scourge is a result of the policy of Roosevelt and his party.

Removing splinters.
 Use a fine needle to remove splinters. ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

Eugene Corryman, who died at St. Johnsbury, July 25, in his 77th year, was undoubtedly one of the oldest cobblers in New England, as he had worked steadily at the bench for 68 years.

Dr. H. Nelson Jackson of Burlington, and chauffeur, who recently completed a trans-continental automobile tour, left Albany, N. Y., yesterday morning for Burlington where they arrived this morning.

K. M. Taft of St. Johnsbury, has sold his wholesale grocery business to the Holbrook grocery company, which has stores in several towns and cities of New Hampshire. Mr. Taft had been in this business three years.

Dr. Harriet E. Parker of Putney, who has been passing a year in America, has gone to Boston and from there will return to Mahara, India, where she has charge of the women's hospital under the auspices of the American board of missions.

There were 25 deaths in Rutland during the month of July. Seven cases of contagious diseases were reported during the month. These included 1 of small-pox, 1 of typhoid fever, 1 of scarlet fever, 2 of measles, 1 of mumps and 1 of chicken pox.

Thomas Rivard, son of Xavier Rivard, living on Prospect Hill, Newport who mysteriously left his home July 24, was discovered in Sutton, Que., last week Wednesday, and has returned to his father's house. Dependancy, caused by ill health, which slightly affected his mind is supposed to be the cause of his going away.

The Mountain View Golf club, composed of the summer residents at Caspian Lake, Greensboro, played the Old Pine Golf club of St. Johnsbury at the latter's grounds Saturday afternoon and the visitors beat one up. The rubber will be played at Greensboro. The member of the Mountain View club include Bliss Perry, Rev. Dr. F. E. Dewhurst of Chicago, Rev. Dr. P. M. Snyder of Rockford, Ill., and several college professors.

Several of the Congregational churches throughout Vermont have recently completed extensive repairs. The Newport church has expended \$1500, the Wallingford church \$3500, and repairs have been made on the church at Plainfield. Special services of rededication will be held soon in both the Plainfield and Wallingford churches. The First Congregational church of Hardwick, now the church at East Hardwick, celebrated its centennial on July 29, the anniversary sermon being given by Rev. Joseph Torrey of Shirley, Mass., who was the only one of the former pastors present.
