Santa Fe Railroad Increases Wages

This means an increased expenditure by the company of \$100,000 yearly, of which \$50,000 will be paid out in Topeka.

Chicago, Sept. 9.—Following the direct charge that money thus far collected by assessment from the various labor unions of Chicago had been wasted and consumed in salaries, the Chicago Federation of Labor abolished its defense fund committee after a stormy session.

Missoula, Mont., Sept. 9.—J. R. Baskerville, a well known Associated Press operator, whose home was in Washington, died here of spotted fever, a strange malady peculiar to this section of Montana. It results from the bite of a woodtick and baffles medical science.

Shipment of English Gold Arrives.
San Francisco, Sept. 9.—The steamer Sonama, which has arrived from Australia and Hawaii, brought a shipment of English gold valued at \$1,850,000.

SAXON'S ARMY MANEUVERS.
Emperor William Takes Part and Has an Exciting Time.
Halle, Prussia, Sept. 9.—In the army maneuvers the emperor led a cavalry corps composed of sixteen regiments on the Prussian, or so called Red army side, against the Saxon army—otherwise the Blues. The empress and Princess Victoria Louise followed the operations in a four horse carriage. The empress was in the field at an early hour.
The 12,000 horses led by the emperor kicked up an immense amount of dust on the dry fields over which they passed, which betrayed the movements of the cavalry. The Saxons, who were entrenched and who had cleverly posted their artillery, received the attack with the fire of all their machine and other quick firing guns in a way that in real war would have quickly decimated his majesty's force. But the emperor galloped on in a whirlwind of dust, penetrated the Saxon line and the umpire decided that the Saxons were defeated and caused them to retreat across the Saale.

Iron Manufacturer Brown Dead.
Youngstown, O., Sept. 9.—Richard Brown, the pioneer iron manufacturer of the Mahoning valley, is dead at his home in Madison avenue at the age of seventy-five years. Mr. Brown was one of the organizers of the Brown Bonnell Rolling Mill company, the oldest iron works of the valley, now a part of the Republic Iron and Steel company. He was president of the board of trustees of Mount Union college, Alliance. He leaves a widow.

Two Chicago Murder Suspects.
Chicago, Sept. 9.—James Redmond, alias William O'Neil, and Arthur Tibbets have been arrested on a charge of complicity in the murders committed in the barns of the Chicago City Railway company a week ago. The evidence against Redmond is entirely circumstantial, the chief part of it being his heavy expenditure of money during the last week.

Norwegian Bark Arabia Arrives.
San Francisco, Sept. 9.—The overdupe Norwegian bark Arabia, reinsured for 2 per cent and generally considered a somewhat dubious risk, has arrived from Glasgow somewhat battered from a conflict with the elements off Cape Horn, but in good working trim and with her cargo intact.
