ENGLAND'S SEVERE GALE.

Much Destruction Reported on Land and Sea.

London, Sept. 12.—From all parts of the country come reports of destruction on land and sea by the terrific gale. The wind has now abated, but telegraphic or other communication with the outside world is only possible after much delay. In some cases the lines are entirely down. The suburbs of the metropolis are littered with trees and branches which have been blown down. The tents of the First Army corps, which was under canvas preparatory to taking part in the maneuvers, were almost all blown to pieces. It is possible that the whole force may be recalled from Aldershot.

The breakwater of the new harbor in course of construction at Dover has been entirely swept away, involving a loss of many thousands of pounds sterling. The channel steamers from France arrived late this morning, after perilously riding out the storm for six or seven hours. Many lifeboat rescues were made and several fatalities and many accidents were recorded. Much wreckage is being washed up all around the coast.

From Dungeness it is reported that a ketch's crew, numbering eight men, were all drowned. At Southsea several bodies have been washed up. Several yachts there got adrift and were wrecked on the beach. A lifeboat has gone to the assistance of a bark which is in distress off Weymouth, and it is feared that a schooner yacht has been lost with all hands.

Rural Letter Carriers Organizing.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Rural letter carriers of the United States are holding a meeting in Chicago to form a national association. Delegates representing 17,000 rural letter carriers, who daily supply 12,000,000 country residents with mail, are in attendance. They travel 500,000 miles every day, their farms covering two-thirds of the best farming districts of America. Better roads, more salary, fewer privations, holidays and numerous other improvements in their conditions are the hope of the rural carriers, who declare they travel over the worst roads in the world. Heretofore the rural carriers have had state organizations. The organization will be known as the National Rural Free Delivery Letter Carriers' association.

VISIT OF ENGLISH WAR SHIPS.

Home Squadron May Be Sent Here as an Act of Courtesy.
London, Sept. 12.—The home squadron, which is commanded by Vice Admiral Sir Arthur K. Wilson, has just returned from a successful participation in the naval maneuvers and will sail Sept. 16 for a six weeks' cruise around Scotland. Shortly afterward, according to the announcement, the squadron will sail for America.

The British home squadron consists of the first class battle ships Benbow, Empress of India, Hood, Revenge, Royal Oak, Royal Sovereign and Sans Pareil, the second class battle ship Anson, the first class cruisers Edgar and Hawke, the second class cruisers Dido, Mersey and Venus and several other powerful cruisers.

Naval officials say they have no information on the report that the home squadron will visit America. On the other hand, the foreign office says other hand, the foreign office says something of the kind has been talked about, but it has no details. Nothing is known of the proposed visit at the United States embassy except that some return visit is likely to be made in the ordinary course of international courtesies.

Artist Kills Himself.

New York, Sept. 12.—Clare Wilson, an artist, who came to New York a year ago from Russellville, Ky., and is said to have been a member of a distinguished southern family, took his life by inhaling illuminating gas. Some returned magazine illustrations and a broken mahogany were found in Wilson's studio on the top floor of 2 West Fourteenth street, where his body was discovered. On a table was found a letter addressed to the sister of the dead man, Mrs. Briggs of Russellville, Ky. There were also two pocketbooks empty.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—General John C. Black, recently elected commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, has appointed his personal staff as follows: Adjutant general, Charles A. Partridge of the department of Illinois; quartermaster general, Charles Murrows of the department of New Jersey; inspector general, Edwin B. Messer of the department of Iowa; judge advocate general, James Tanner of the department of New York.

Milk For Chicago School Children.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—The children in the Chicago public schools will no longer have to drink impure water if a proposal of the milk commission meets with the approval of the board of education. Pasteurized milk, on sale at a penny a bottle at every school, is the solution of the problem suggested by the commission.

Condition of Fred S. Gibbs.

Asbury Park, N. J., Sept. 12.—Members of the family of Frederick S. Gibbs said that he had passed a bad night and was much weaker. No hopes of his recovery are entertained, although it is said he may live for several days.

Aged Railroad Man Killed.

Tarrytown, N. Y., Sept. 12.—John Ward, seventy years old, of Peekskill was killed by a New York Central train at Tivoli. He was a freight conductor for forty years and is said to have been the oldest conductor on the road.

Site For Kaiser's Gift.

Berlin, Sept. 12.—According to advices from Rome the city council of the Italian capital has decided to erect the monument of Goethe, presented by the German emperor, in the gardens of the Villa Borghese.
