EXCURSION TO NEW YORK.

Annual Fall Excursion Over Central Vermont, Tuesday, Sept. 22.

The annual fall excursion to New York over the Central Vermont Railway to New London and thence by steamer "City of Lowell" of the Norwich Line, will occur Sept. 22. The Central offers the following low rates to New York and return: From Williamstown, Barre, Montpelier, Northfield, Waterbury, Middlesex and all stations south, for only \$8.00. A special train will run to New London, leaving Barre at 12:50 p. m., Montpelier at 1:10, Waterbury 1, Middlesex 1:10, West Berlin 1:25 and Northfield at 1:35 p. m.

Tickets will be good going only on special train (and branch trains connecting with special) Sept. 22 to arrive in New York on the morning of Sept. 23. Good returning to leave New York any day until Oct. 1st, inclusive.

No stop over privileges allowed. Returning the Norwich Line steamers leave pier 40, North River, (foot of Clarkson street) week days only at 5:30 p. m.

ADOPT WIRELESS.

American and Red Star Steamship Lines Will Be Equipped.

Notice has been received by the Ballard Steamship Agency that the International Mercantile Marine Co. have just completed arrangements so that from now on all steamers of the American and Red Star Lines will be equipped with the wireless telegraphic apparatus placing the steamers at all times in communication with the land. The steamers will receive telegraphic news each day and messages will be received from east bound steamers at Pololu station on the coast of England and west bound steamers will receive telegrams from Siasconset Station, Nantucket. They have made a rate of \$2 per message of ten words, address and signature not counted, and 12 cents for each word over ten. This rate is in addition to the regular commercial tolls at Sagaponak, Long Island, from which point the above rates are made.

The above arrangements makes feasible the receiving and sending of messages by passengers at all times while at sea and marks a new era in steamship navigation.

JUMPED IN HIS SLEEP.

Rev. W. D. Spencer, Known in Western Vermont, Received Injuries.

Vergennes, Sept. 15.—News has been received here of a serious accident which happened to the Rev. W. D. Spencer, well known throughout Troy conference, at Manchester, N. H., one night last week. 
