THE ALASKAN CABLE

Work on Line Between Seattle and the Lynn Canal.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 17.—The United States cable ship Burnside has sailed for the north to continue the work of laying the cable from the head of Lynn canal by way of Sitka, the capital of Alaska, to this city. She has a stretch of 600 miles of cable aboard, which was transferred from the steamship Texan, while brought the cable around the Horn from New York.

On board the Burnside when she sailed were General A. W. Greely, chief signal officer of the United States army; Colonel James Allen of the signal corps, under whose general supervision the line will be laid; Captain Edgar Russell and Captain George O. Burnett of the signal corps; Henry Winter, cable engineer; Lieutenant Charles P. F. Chandler of the quartermaster's department. Captain A. H. Laffin is in command of the vessel.

The Burnside proceeds direct to Juneau, where, after making a short line connection, she will leave for Sitka, paying out about 250 miles between the two towns, and continuing south from the capital by the open ocean as far as the cable rope will reach, possibly to a point off Queen Charlotte isle. It is expected that the entire consignment of cable on the Burnside will be laid and the vessel be back in this port for the final link by Oct. 15.

Mrs. Tucker, with her husband, was driving in the east part of the town. Mr. Tucker got out of the wagon to get a cake of ice when the horse became frightened and ran away.

Mrs. Tucker was in the wagon and was carried some distance when the wagon came in contact with a telephone pole and she was thrown from the wagon and badly hurt. She was carried to the residence of A. E. Higley, which is near by, and Dr. Eddy was summoned, who was soon on the scene together with Miss Dean, a trained nurse, who worked on her until she was brought to consciousness. The horse, after it had freed itself, ran into the yard of Allen Calhoun. It came with in a few feet of running over the young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Calhoun, who was playing in the yard and in trying to jump the fence between Calhoun's and Higley's his front foot caught on the wire and threw him forward and was killed.
