### THEIR CLAIMS CUT.

Commissioners in Daniel T. McGovern Case File Report.

Montpelier, Sept. 23.—Commissioners T. J. Deavitt and T. J. Kelleher at the estate of the late Daniel T. McGovern filed their report showing the following cuts in claims:

The following figures show the cuts: John W. Gordon from \$1,442.70 to \$684.70; F. L. Laird from \$1,471.58 to \$746.08; Lord & Carleton from \$321.49 to \$151.55; Henry Ballard from \$200 to \$75.70; William McGovern from \$1,050 to \$120.32; Elizabeth McGovern from \$151 to \$61; Daniel F. McGovern from \$305 to \$15.00; Robert L. McGovern from \$1,306.92 to \$440.08; Alice Page from \$165 to \$60; Charles Boswick from \$300.32 to \$190.03. The total of claims allowed is \$3,427, which leaves a balance of about \$1,000 not covered by claims. All there is in the estate is the verdict of \$4,280 and costs.
