WHOLESALE MARRAORE.

Sofa Gets Report of Turkish Slaughter of Thousands of Christians. Sofia, Bulgaria, Oct. 3.—The Macedonian revolutionary headquarters assert that they have positive information that the whole Christian population of the town of Mehomia (Rasslog), province of Seres, was massacred Sept. 25, with the exception of ten men who escaped with the news. Mehomia is an important town and the seat of the local government. The population was about equally divided between Turks and Bulgarians. The latter numbered 3,200 persons. According to the fugitives, when the general rising was declared in the Rasslog district on Sunday the Turkish troops in the Piria mountains hurried to Mehomia and surrounded the town, rendering the escape of the Christians impossible. The Bulgarian population was prepared to join in the rising, several insurgents' agents being in the Bulgarian quarter of the town at the time. Desperate fighting occurred in the streets, bombs and dynamite being freely used. After fighting for five or six hours the Turks gained the upper hand and proceeded to massacre every Bulgarian they encountered.

Marion Pollock Johnson has signed with Broadway & Currie to play Anna Hyslop in "A Fool and His Money" company. "Em'ly," a play made from Dickens' "David Copperfield," has proved a hopeless failure in London. Miss Madge Lessing had the title role. Viola Allen is to open in Shakespeare's delightful comedy, "Twelfth Night," during the week of Feb. 1, at Pittsburgh. This has been definitely and finally settled. In the fourth act of "Hearts Adrift" there is applied the famous third degree of police fame by the hero to the villain in order to get from his confession of his guilt. Mr. Piner's latest play, which Charles Frohman will produce at the Duke of York's theater, London, has been named "Letty." It contains four acts and an epilogue. Mary Anderson writes that the reports that she had consented to make an American tour under the management of Robert Grau are absolutely false and that she has no intention of reappearing on the stage.

BALFOUR AT SHEFFIELD.

Declines to Conservatism That the Party is Stronger Than Ever. Sheffield, England, Oct. 3.—The Conservative associations unanimously adopted the official resolution introduced by Sir John E. Dorrington, in endorsing Premier Balfour's policy. The "rider" proposed thanking Mr. Chamberlain for his "patriotic efforts" was withdrawn. Premier Balfour addressed the delegates after lunch. In the course of his speech he announced that Lord Milner did not feel himself able to accept the colonial secretaryship. Mr. Balfour went on to say that recent events had not substantially divided the party, but they had divided the government, and the parting of old friends had been accompanied by regret. Both those who went and those who stayed were devoted to the Unionist party, the government and the empire. They had lost the greatest colonial minister the country had ever seen. His services could not be exaggerated. He had to leave Mr. Chamberlain to express his own views, which did not differ a hair's breadth from his (Mr. Balfour's).

Although Lord Milner had declined the colonial secretaryship, Mr. Balfour added; he was in entire agreement with the government on its imperial and domestic policy. Speaking of the prospects of the party, the premier declared the Unionist party was never in better heart and its opponents were never more hopelessly embarrassed. So long as his majesty would support the government of which he was the head he would never think of deserting the cause for which he was responsible.

Second—To see if the City will vote to issue its note or bonds, or both, for the purpose of paying for said improvements; and if it so votes, to determine what amount of new bonds or notes, or both, shall be issued, the rate per cent of interest, and what time and place they shall be payable, and whether the same shall be registered or have the interest coupons attached.
