FINED FOR EMBEZZLEMENT.

Frank Slack of Rutland Fined \$40 With Costs.

Rutland, Oct. 6.—Frank Slack was fined \$40 and costs in city court today for embezzlement of a fire insurance premium, which he was sent to collect from Miss Hattie Green of Center street. There was another count to the complaint charging him with failing to turn over a premium collected from City Judge Willis M. Ross, but as the case was tried before Judge Ross the court and attorneys could not figure out any way to press that count and it was dropped. Only two witnesses were examined. C. C. Fletcher testified to giving Slack the policy to collect the premium, and Miss Green testified that Slack owed her more money than the premium amounted to and said she gave him credit for it, the case was appealed to county court.

BOSTON EXCURSION.

Central Vermont Annual Trip Occurs on Oct. 13.

The annual fall excursion to Boston over the Central Vermont Railway from Williamstown, Barre, Montpelier, Northfield, Randolph, etc., will be run on Tuesday, Oct. 13. The Central will sell special round trip tickets at the following reduced rates: Williamstown, \$6.35; South Barre, \$6.15; Barre, \$6; Montpelier, \$6; West Berlin, \$6; Northfield, \$5.55. Tickets will be good going on the midnight train Monday and the morning and noon trains Tuesday. Good returning to arrive at starting point until October 24, inclusive.

There will be through sleeping cars from Barre and Montpelier attached to the 12.01 train from Barre Monday night and berths can be secured at any time now by applying at the local ticket office.

Captain Waterman Resigns.

Brattleboro, Oct. 5.—Capt Ernest J. Waterman yesterday afternoon tendered to Adjutant J. Harry Estey his resignation as captain of Co. I, Vermont National Guard, which will be acted upon soon. Capt. Waterman goes to Washington, D. C., to take up the duties of his recent appointment as assistant clerk to the Senate committee on agriculture and forestry, of which Senator Redfield Proctor of Vermont is chairman.
