BOSTON EXCURSION.

Central Vermont Annual Trip Occurs on Oct. 13.

The annual fall excursion to Boston over the Central Vermont Railway from Williamstown, Barre, Montpelier, Northfield, Randolph, etc., will be run on Tuesday, Oct. 13. The Central will sell special round trip tickets at the following reduced rates: Williamstown, \$6.35; South Barre, \$6.15; Barre, \$5; Montpelier, \$5; West Berlin, \$3; Northfield, \$5.55. Tickets will be good going on the midnight train Monday and the morning and noon trains Tuesday. Good returning to arrive at starting point until October 24, inclusive.

There will be through sleeping cars from Barre and Montpelier attached to the 12.01 train from Barre Monday night and berths can be secured at any time now by applying at the local ticket office.
