

DRIVEN FROM HOMES BY THE HIGH WATER AT PATERSON, N. J.

The Deluge From Yesterday's Storm Is Doing Great Damage--Homeless Housed in Halls--All Work Suspended.

Railroads Out of Paterson Are Not Running Today--Silk Mills and Locomotive Works Shut Down.

Paterson, N. J., Oct. 10.--The water is steadily rising here and it is feared the worst has not yet happened. The flood is now within a few inches of West and Main streets.

The mayor has hired Apollo Hall for the refugees. These homeless ones and many who have not tasted food for twelve or fourteen hours, are now being fed there.

Coffin cases are being built around several mills to protect the silk stored in the basements. Considerable excitement was caused in the Passaic Steel Works where it was feared the water would reach the boilers and cause an explosion.

AUDITOR CASTLE RESIGNS.

Retirement Not Due to Postal Scandal, He Says. Washington, Oct. 10.--Announcement of the resignation of H. A. Castle, auditor for the post office department, is made.

In reply to a question as to whether his resignation had been induced by any charges connected with the investigation into the affairs of the post office department Mr. Castle replied in the negative.

"My only reason for resigning is that which has been given. I wanted to get out of official life, and I was especially anxious to avoid spending the last summer in Washington. I was urged, however, to remain until the investigation could be made, and now that it is over, I want to get out before the congressional inquiry commences."
