AN AUTOMATIC SCAFFOLD.

Condemned Man in Cheyenne, Wyo., Will Be His Own Executioner.

Sheriff Smalley of Cheyenne, Wyo., has let the contract for the scaffold upon which Tom Horn, the notorious cattle detective, will be his own executioner on Nov. 20 to James P. Julien. When Charlie Miller, fifteen years of age, was sentenced to hang Sheriff Kelley had compunctions about executing the lad. Talking with Julien, he expressed his feelings on the matter, and Julien, possessing some genius as an inventor, told Kelley he could contrive a gallows which would work automatically. Miller's scaffold was the result.

The simplicity of the construction makes the operation sure. When the condemned man steps on the trap a weight opens a valve in a vessel of water under the scaffold, and when the vessel becomes empty the counter-balance operates and jerks the plug under the trap, letting the drop fall and shooting the condemned man into eternity.

Sovelty in Gloves For Men.

Quite the smartest things in new fall gloves for men are the white and tan driving gloves. These have, in the first place, a special cut—an anatomical cut. It is called—to fit the lines of the hand. They fasten at the wrist—which is loose, to give full play to the muscles—with a single button. The glove is of white and tan combined. The back and wrist are of the white, and the palm of the hand and inside and between the fingers are of the dark skin. The gloves are called the four-in-hand and cost \$2.50.

Central Vermont Annual Trip Occurs on Oct. 12.

The annual fall excursion to Boston over the Central Vermont Railway from Williamstown, Barre, Montpelier, Northfield, Randolph, etc., will be run on Tuesday, Oct. 19.
