SOUTH CAROLINA'S DISGRACE.

A South Carolina jury had the case of ex-Lieutenant-Governor James H. Tillman, charged with the murder of Editor Gonzales, they had it for two-thirds of a day, supposedly turning over the evidence piece by piece. And then what did that jury do? They returned a verdict of not guilty. But their decision is no surprise to those people who have been watching the case. They have said all along that Tillman would not be found guilty. It shows a peculiar state of affairs and it shows pretty conclusively that it was not merely Tillman who was being tried. The custom, peculiar to that section, of carrying weapons and using them whenever any provocation arises, was being tried and it was vindicated. In the future we shall need to see the custom continued as in the past. A "gentleman" fancies he has a grievance against another man. He takes the matter into his own hands and shoots down his opponent, defenceless though he may be.

The whole trial of this sensational South Carolina case seemed to hinge on the fact that the man who was shot had his hand in his overcoat pocket when he was met by Tillman. The latter thought that fact was sufficient justification for him to draw his own weapon and fire point blank at Gonzales, although it developed later that Gonzales was unarmed. When the judge made the charge to the jury he emphasized this point, that Gonzales had his right hand in his overcoat pocket. Now this fact seems to have had a powerful effect on the jury, and it is what probably saved Tillman from being convicted on the charge of murder. Hereafter the South Carolinians who have their enemies will not be safe to go about the streets with their hands in their overcoat pockets. A man may meet one of his enemies and that enemy may see the hand in the pocket and make that a sufficient provocation for drawing a bead. No man is safe perhaps with his hand in his overcoat pocket, yet the glorious "custom" is vindicated. Yet we have not much doubt what the verdict would have been had the prisoner been some one else than Tillman, if he had been a negro, for instance.

It's a happy showing which the savings institutions of Vermont make this year, and the increase of deposits over last year is a source of gratification. The deposits during the year have increased over two and one half million dollars, while the number of depositors is 3,794 larger than in the year previous. It is interesting to note that the deposits have gained, but what is more interesting and what is of more vital importance is the increase in the number of depositors, more than five thousand for a year. This means that while money is being saved by Vermont people, those who are already depositors are not responsible for the most of that two million and a half. It is the new depositors, those who are just getting into the habit of saving, who are doing it. It is the best augur for the good of the state.

Returning leave Montreal at 9.01 a. m., 1.55 and 3.40 p. m.

Tickets will be good to go on all regular trains named above October 20th, and good to arrive back at starting point until October 22, 1908. Good only for continuous passage. No stop over allowed at intermediate points.

Communication On Union Matters.

Editor Daily Times, Sir: A notice appears in The Times every once in a while purporting to give the names of the union blacksmith shops in Barre. In every case the "Union Cash Horsehoing" is omitted and I have to ask you to grant me space to explain why it is omitted and examine in public the credentials of those men who call themselves union blacksmiths.

Something over a year ago I, along with a few others, organized and received a charter from the Journeymen Horsehoers union. This association or combination of bosses, calling themselves union men, used every effort to break up our organization chiefly because we succeeded in making them agree to the nine hour day after having to come out on strike for it.

I quite agree that union men should take notice of the situation in accordance with their expressed wish in the adv. inserted, but I am surprised to find them anxious to court the public gaze. About 13 months ago when they were fighting against the nine hour day and using every method they could devise to break up an organization they were not so clamorous after publicity.

To my certain knowledge I am the only one in town that holds a union card and acted then in accordance with union principles. It says much for the strength of unionism in Barre when the most inveterate nonunionists in town have to appeal to the unionist sentiment to secure support, but in justice to trade unionists I think it only right that their union principles should be made as public as their adv. I am not doing this through any feelings of disappointment engendered by being outside their combine because that was a matter of choice with me. I duly received an invitation to join them, but with my knowledge of their principles and past actions I much preferred to keep away and keep my union card clean.

I have no wish to remind them of all this, or in anyway to injure them in the eyes of their fellows, but when they go around my customers insinuating a palpable falsehood about my standing as a unionist, and openly publish another about their own it is time to protest. Fred Belware.

CIVIC FEDERATION MEETS.

To Discuss Relations Between Labor and Capital.

Chicago, Oct. 15.—Employers and labor representatives of national reputation were in attendance in Steinway hall at the opening session of the National Civic federation conference, which is to discuss and debate questions affecting wage earner and capitalist in an effort to better relations between them and to right industrial evil.

William D. Mahon, president of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees of America; Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor; John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers, and S. S. McClure of New York were among those present at the gathering, which was called to order by Judge Arba N. Waterman, president of the Chicago branch of the Civic federation. Capital was also represented, as was the farmer, R. T. F. Woodlock, editor of a New York financial paper, Oscar S. Strauss, president of the New York board of trade and transportation, and John M. Stahl, who will represent the agriculturists, being in attendance.
