

**London Honorables Depart.** Boston, Oct. 16.—The members of the Honorable Artillery Company of London have said farewell to American shores after a stay of nearly two weeks in this country as the guests of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts. During the fortnight's visit the Englishmen have enjoyed the most elaborate hospitality in this city and have visited New York, West Point, Washington and Niagara in the States, and Toronto and Montreal in Canada, on a tour planned to give them a birdseye view of the conditions at least of the eastern part of the United States.

**Trying to Settle Miners' Strike.** Victor, Colo., Oct. 16.—Negotiations are pending for an amicable settlement of the miners' strike in this district, according to a persistent report that has gained currency. A committee has gone to Colorado Springs from here to confer with representatives of the Mine Owners' association and Manager MacNeill of the United States Reduction and Refining company. The strike here was inaugurated in sympathy with the mill men employed in the plants of the latter company.

**Twenty-four Probably Drowned.** London, Oct. 16.—Advices received here say that wreckage from the British bark Loch Long, Captain Strachan, which sailed from Noumea, New Caledonia, April 29 for Grenock, has been washed ashore at the Chatham Islands and that it is feared the vessel and the twenty-four persons on board of her have been lost.

**United States Marshal Removed.** Washington, Oct. 16.—The president, upon the recommendation of the attorney general, has removed Marshal Fred A. Fick of the district of Vermont for dereliction of duty in permitting the escape at Providence, R. I., of three Chinamen entrusted to him for deportation.

**Moody Merrill's Bonds Defaulted.** Boston, Oct. 16.—When the case of Moody Merrill, who is under indictment charged with embezzling various sums, was called in the superior court, the respondent was not present, and his bonds were defaulted.
