Big Steamer Has Hard Voyage.

New York, Oct. 29.—The North German Lloyd steamer Kronprinz Wilhelm has arrived from Bremen, Southampton and Cherbourg after a most tempestuous voyage. At no time since leaving Cherbourg did the ship steam at full speed. Heavy southwest to northwest gales at times of hurricane force prevailed, with rough seas and high southwesterly swells. Great combing seas swept over the fore decks, smashed rails, bent stanchions, carried away ventilators and seriously injured the captain and a seaman.

Mayor Jones Ill.

Toledo, O., Oct. 29.—The health of Mayor Jones is causing his friends the gravest anxiety, the more so that he has refused medical treatment and persists in physical culture and fasting. The most serious attack occurred when while returning on foot and alone from a church bazaar at which he had spoken he collapsed on the sidewalk. He succeeded in hailing a dray drawn by a team of mules and was carried to his home.

The Machias of Naples.

Naples, Italy, Oct. 28.—The United States gunboat Machias has arrived here from Port Said and is coaling preparatory to taking United States Consul Schinner of Marseilles and his expedition to Jibuti, French Somaliland, whence the expedition will start for Abyssinia.

Commission to Consider Macedonia Constantino, Oct. 28.—The council of ministers has appointed a commission to consider the Austro-Russian demands and to ascertain the attitude of the other powers on the subject.

PRINCE GALITZIN STABBED.

Attempt to Murder Governor of the Caucasus Fails.

Tiflis, Russian Transcaucasia, Oct. 29. Prince Galitzin, governor general of the Caucasus, has had a narrow escape from assassination on the outskirts of the town. Three natives stabbed the governor general thrice. They died, but were subsequently shot down by Cossacks.

Prince Galitzin was driving with his wife when the would be assassins rushed upon the carriage, daggers in hand. Two seized the governor general and attempted to drag him from the vehicle, while the third man inflicted two ugly wounds on the prince's head and a third cut on the hand.

A Cossack who was in attendance upon his excellency threw himself upon the assailants. While a hand to hand fight was in progress the carriage was driven off at a gallop. Ultimately the assailants fled, followed by a mounted guard of Cossacks who had hurried to the scene.

The Cossacks chased the fugitives through the brush, firing constantly with their rifles. They killed one man instantly. The other two were shot down and died soon afterward.

After his injuries had been dressed Prince Galitzin attended a reception given by the citizens of Tiflis.

The outrage has produced great indignation, the governor having become popular on account of his interest in the welfare of the inhabitants. Owing to the excitement performances at the theaters were suspended.

There is little doubt that the thickness of the cap worn by the prince saved his life.

Cuban Bishops Consecrated.

Havana, Oct. 29.—The Right Rev. Pedro Gonzalez Estrada, the Right Rev. Bonaventura F. Broderick and the Right Rev. Manuel Orue have been consecrated in the cathedral, respectively bishop of Havana, auxiliary bishop of Havana and bishop of Pinar del Rio, in accordance with the reorganization of the Roman Catholic church in Cuba due to the separation of Cuba from Spanish sovereignty. The ceremonies were conducted by his excellency the Most Rev. P. L. Chapelle, archbishop of New Orleans and apostolic delegate to Cuba and Porto Rico, assisted by the Most Rev. Francisco de Barnada, archbishop of Santiago.

General Miles in Seattle.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 29.—General Nelson A. Miles has come to Seattle from California, where he has been looking after property interests. He will go hence to Washington. General Miles denied recently stories that he had made heavy investments in Texas oil fields and intended to make that state his home. He declared he has no interests in Texas.
