SHIP MAST UNDER ROOF.

Annapolis Students Have Full Spread of Sails For Indoor Practice.
The unique spectacle of a full spread mast, with all the sails, yards, blocks and ropes exactly as on a full rigged ship, within four walls and under a roof is now to be seen at the new bathhouse at the Naval academy in Annapolis.
It is stated by those at the Naval academy who have studied the subject that it is the only one of the kind in the world. There is a large mast used for purposes of instruction in Germany, but it is out of doors, and there is a small mast in a building at Newport, but it is not nearly the size of the one at Annapolis.
The mast which has been erected in the bathhouse is seventy-two feet in height and is exactly like in every way the mizenmast of the United States steamship Chesapeake, which was especially constructed for the practice work of the midshipmen.

Police Doggies Now.
The dog policeman is the newest official on the force of Ghent, Belgium. The particular duty of the police doggie will be as an "emergency man." The officers are stationed at various intervals in the street, the dogs being held in leash at points between two "beats." When the "emergency man" is needed, the policeman blows a trumpet. At the sound the animals are loosed and rush to report for duty. They are trained to spring into the water, follow a track or join a man hunt along the docks.
