### KAISER DESIGNS A CUP.

To Be Given to Winner of Transatlantic Yacht Race.

Berlin, Nov. 17.—Emperor William is himself designing the cup that will be given by his majesty for a transatlantic yacht race. The statement sent to the United States from here that the emperor's American built schooner Meteor would be entered was premature. The emperor has not yet decided to do so. Some of the considerations against entering the yacht are that his majesty has no other yacht to race at Kiel in June and that the passage to America would have to be begun in March, during the period of rough weather. By the long southern route, via the Azores and the West Indies, a good sailor could do the distance in thirty days with no mishap, especially if an accompanying cruiser tows the yacht, but this is only possible in fine weather.

The foreign office and the navy department say it is not true that the imperial yacht Hohenzollern is preparing to go to North America, as announced in the German newspapers.
