Sloane Sues French Jockey Club.
Paris, Nov. 24.—The suit of Tod Sloane, the American jockey, against the French Jockey club came up in the civil court before a large attendance of sportsmen and jockeys. Sloane claims \$40,000 damages for being warned off the turf in connection with Count de St. Phalle's Rose de Mai winning the race for the Prix de Diane at the Chantilly races May 17, 1903. The case is attracting much attention, as it involves the Jockey club's sole control of the turf administration. Maitre Labor began the presentation of Sloane's case by protesting against the decision.

Car Load of Mail Burned.
Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 24.—A car on the Missouri Pacific fast mail train from St. Louis caught fire en route and the car and its contents, twenty tons of second and third class mail matter, were consumed. The car was detached from the rest of the train, and none of the cars was damaged. No one was hurt. The car contained newspapers, magazines and books from the east.

Another Labor Council in Chicago.
Chicago, Nov. 24.—By the organization of the Metal Trades council another central labor body has been formed in Chicago. The council will bring together many of the strongest unions in the city working in similar crafts. Its purpose is to enable the various unions represented to act in harmony in securing terms and contracts from employers.

Rain Washed Air.

Nitroglycerin Kills Two.
Emporium, Pa., Nov. 24.—Two persons were killed and one seriously injured by the explosion of a large quantity of nitroglycerin at the Keystone Nitroglycerin works, about a mile from here. Those killed were John Morse and H. Cruikshank. George Nickerson had one of his lower limbs terribly crushed. Hundreds of panes of glass were broken in this village.
