SEA LIONS AS PETS.
 Great Demand For Them Both Here and Abroad.
 The latest California product in considerable demand in eastern and European cities is the sea lion, says the San Francisco Examiner. Captain J. R. Mullett of Detroit, Mich., who arrived at San Francisco recently, is the authority for the statement. He says he has orders for more live sea lions than he can fill.
 It has become quite the fad among New York millionaires to have one or two sea lions as pets in little lakes on their country estates. The California sea lion also has a ready sale in all the European zoological gardens owing to its size and attractive appearance. Captain Mullett has gone to Santa Barbara, where he will take a gasoline-schooner and embark on a hunting cruise around the Santa Barbara Islands. He expects to capture thirty or forty of the seals with little difficulty.
 In discussing his sea lion trade Captain Mullett said that he captured thirty of the animals last spring on the island of Santa Cruz. They were caught while they were on land by the aid of lassos and nets. The seals make a desperate fight for their liberty, but after being placed in crates they become comparatively docile in two or three days.
 When a sufficient number have been captured they are taken to the east in a special car in charge of an attendant, who feeds them on fish and gives them an occasional bath. In New York they are fattened, and if they are to be shipped to Europe they are given several weeks' rest. The percentage of those dying is small. In fact, Captain Mullett says they thrive and grow much larger in captivity than when they are in their wild natural state.
 The management of the zoological gardens at Antwerp purchased ten California sea lions last spring. Those are all doing well and proved such an attraction that a number of other European cities have placed orders for them.

BAN ON CORSETS.
 Englishwomen Waging a Crusade Against Time Honored Article.
 Perhaps it is too much to say that the "new woman" has inaugurated a campaign against feminine traditions, but it is certain that from Leeds and Birmingham blasts have been sounded upon the trumpets of the antiscorset crusade, while in London and the suburbs the new rainy day skirt, which within the last few months has been seen in large numbers, is already working a reform in teaching women to be careful how they walk, says the New York Herald.
 Leagues have been formed for the suppression of that first mentioned article, which has so long been regarded as essential to feminine dress, and men are being enrolled among the members.
 That women are bad walkers—many being pigeon-toed—is declared to be one revelation of the new skirt. Physical culturists, discussing the question, say the greatest offender is the "man-nish girl," whose attempt to assume man's ease and freedom is an absurd mimicry. Watch a woman going upstairs at a railway station. In nine cases out of ten they will plod laboriously up, their feet coming down at either side of the stair, toes turned in.
 In sitting, too, women are guilty of a number of sins of awkwardness. A stout woman invariably sits squarely, with her feet planted twelve inches apart. The lean woman winds her feet about the legs of the chair or else crosses her legs and thrusts her feet out in front of her, while the small woman either sits with her feet dangling in a hopeless way or perches herself on a high seat with one foot touching the ground and the other hooked around the ankle of the first.
