#### RUSSIA MAY YIELD.

German Foreign Office Hears Reassuring News.

Berlin, Dec. 25.—An intimation has reached the Japanese legation here that Russia will concede Japan's requests.

Inquiries made by the Associated Press as to particulars of this intimation, whether it came from Tokyo or St. Petersburg, brought out nothing more than that a peaceful solution is now highly probable.

The British government, it is understood from another source, has represented to the czar that Great Britain deems Japan's demands just and earnestly expects that Russia will grant them. This representation is supported by the utterances of the British ambassadors here and in Paris and Vienna, who have informed the respective governments to which they are accredited that Japan, in the opinion of the British government, will fight, if Russia holds to the position taken in her recent note.

The Russian ambassador here has for several days been inquiring freely what the opinions of the diplomatic corps are.

Yuan Shi Kai, the commander in chief of the Chinese army and navy, has taken steps for the rapid reorganization of the Chinese army. According to the Cologne Gazette's advices from St. Petersburg, Yuan Shi Kai proposes immediately to create military schools with special training courses for noncommissioned officers and a cadet corps, a general staff and a military academy to be opened in 1905. The introduction of universal military service is also planned as well as an increase of the artillery.

Yuan Shi Kai is reported to have advised the court mandarins to wait three years, until the reorganization of the army is complete, before declaring war on Russia.

Important Conference in Tokyo. London, Dec. 25.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram company from Tokyo says Premier Katsura and War Minister Terachi visited the Marquis Ito, president of the privy council, and the Marquis Yamagata, chief of the council of field marshals, at their villas this morning, two hours' distance by rail from Tokyo. The meetings are believed to have been connected with important developments in the Russian-Japanese situation. The ministers returned to Tokyo in the evening.

#### JUDGE BALDWIN EXONERATED.

Nuremberg Consul Had No Connection With Postal Frauds.

Washington, Dec. 25.—In the report of Messrs. Conrad and Bonaparte on their investigation of the irregularities in the postoffice department allusion is made in connection with their inquiry into the charges of fraud regarding the placing in the department of "Brandt-Dent cashiers," to possible connection with the case of Judge Baldwin, United States consul at Nuremberg, Germany.

The allusion was made in such a manner as to reflect upon the integrity of that official. The statements excited deep interest in the west, particularly in Ohio, where Judge Baldwin has been a conspicuous figure, socially and politically, for many years. The state department was looked to for proof.

The matter was referred to Third Assistant Secretary Herbert H. D. Peirce, who, after making an exhaustive investigation, has submitted to President Roosevelt an extended report fully exonerating Judge Baldwin.

#### MR. BRYAN IN BERLIN.

A Series of Entertainments For Him Being Prepared.

Berlin, Dec. 25.—William J. Bryan arrived here from St. Petersburg. He was met by Dr. Otto Ahrendt, a member of the reichstag and one of the principal advocates of bimetalism in Germany. Mr. Bryan will go to Copenhagen and return here Saturday.

He will be entertained then privately at luncheon by Ambassador Towne. The American chamber of commerce will give Mr. Bryan a reception Saturday evening. His presence in Berlin has formally been brought to the attention of Emperor William by Baron von Richthofen, the secretary of foreign affairs, and possibly an audience will be the result.

#### DREYFUS VINDICATED.

Commission Unanimously Recommends Revision of His Case.

Paris, Dec. 25.—The Dreyfus commission has unanimously recommended a revision of the case by the criminal branch of the court of cassation. The court will assemble next month to hear the case.

This seems to indicate the truth of the report circulated last week by La Liberté to the effect that Dreyfus would be restored to the army with the rank of lieutenant colonel.

#### Both Her Lovers Killed.

Neosho, Mo., Dec. 25.—Cooper Lauderdale and Vest Collins, rivals in a love affair, met at a dance here and engaged in a pistol duel in which both were killed. The girl favored Lauderdale, who escorted her to the dance. Collins insisted on escorting her home.

#### Galloway For Fair Organizer.

St. Louis, Dec. 25.—Charles Galloway of St. Louis has been commissioned as the official organizer of the world's fair. The organ will be the largest in the world and will be installed in Festival hall, on Art hill.


