A SWEETHEARTS' PARLOR.

Innovation Planned by Cincinnati Pastor For Young Lovers.

A "sweethearts' parlor" is one of the innovations that Rev. James O. White intends to introduce into his work, recently begun in Cincinnati. Rev. White reached Cincinnati from Trimountain, Mich., a few days ago and took up his duties as the superintendent of the Union Bethel, on the public landing, says the Cincinnati Enquirer.

Speaking of his new charge and of changes and improvements he contemplates, Rev. White said:

"Now, there are many homes in this vicinity in which there are daughters who are of an age when they begin to seek the society of young men. In many instances they cannot invite their young sweethearts to their homes, as in some cases the homes furnish no suitable accommodations for entertainment. This forces these girls to meet the young men on the street corners, and the associations sometimes result disastrously. I want to give these young women the home accommodations that their parents cannot give and am going to fit up our parlors here at the Bethel and throw them open as a trying place for these young lovers. They will be made welcome here as often as they see fit to entertain their friends, and I believe the influence for good will be great."

Rev. White will also organize a movement by which the home life of all within his jurisdiction will be looked after by himself or Mrs. White, who has been appointed assistant superintendent.

Savagery of a Fox.

That foxes are cowards is disproved by the story of Henry Peters, who was savagely attacked by a fox recently while going unarmed through a wood, says a dispatch from Coshocton to the Cleveland Plain Dealer. He came upon a battle between a fox and two skunks. He dispatched the skunks, and the fox turned on him, sinking its teeth into his arm in several places and fighting like a wolf. Hunters say the incident is remarkable.

SPARTAN'S LOVE OF HOME.

With a Broken Back, He Started For His Grecian Home.

Peter Prettis, a Greek who has been employed with a construction crew on the Santa Fe railway, was placed on a cot at the Union depot in Kansas City, Mo., the other night and, in charge of his brother, started for Sparta, Greece. The man's back was broken. About a month ago he was injured by a hand car near Olivette, Kan. He was taken to the hospital at Ottawa and afterward brought to St. Joseph's hospital in Kansas City, says the Kansas City Times.

Prettis had been in the United States about a year. After his back had been broken by the hand car and he lay in the hospital, unable to move his legs, a desire to be back in his native land came over him. The Santa Fe railroad gave him about \$1,000, and with this sum he started toward home. His brother Will, who went on the long journey with him, said they had a little property back in Greece, and with what they had saved while at work the injured man would have plenty to support him for the rest of his life. The injured man has a wife and baby waiting for him in Sparta.

A CHURCH INNOVATION.

Highly Colored Blotters Utilized in Cleveland to Advertise Services.

Recently the Hough Avenue Congregational church in Cleveland, O., created much comment by employing a press agent who had been formerly employed in the same capacity by a theater, and now the Franklin Circle Church of Christ has inaugurated a novelty in church advertisement in the shape of a highly colored blotter, says the Chicago Inter Ocean.

This blotter contains an invitation to worship at the edifice, a picture of which appears on the large sheet of ink absorbent, the invitation being extended to traveling men in particular. These blotters will soon be found on the writing tables of every hotel and club in Cleveland. The Rev. Edgar D. Jones and his congregation expect much from the innovation. They will be distributed by Sunday school children.
