SOMNAMBLIST'S EXPLOIT.

Boy Asleep Climbed a Coconut Palm in Hawaii. A peculiar case of somnambulism was recently reported from Hanaele, on the island of Kauai, one of the Hawaiian Islands, says a San Francisco special to the St. Louis Republic.

William Williams, aged twelve years, disappeared from his home one morning. When he did not return for breakfast nor late in the forenoon his parents became anxious, and search was made for him. After some time a native found him lying in the shadow of a great bowlder in a place difficult of access. When the native saw him he gave a shout partly to announce to the other searchers that the boy was found and also to awaken the boy, who seemed fast asleep. The shout awoke the boy suddenly, and, seeing the native's black eyes staring at him, he afterward explained, he thought a wild pig, many of which are found in the region, was about to attack him.

To escape the boy climbed a tall coconut tree growing a hundred yards away. As he did not respond nor come down when called to the native climbed up after him, but was kept at bay by the boy with a twelve inch knife. Finally his father came and spoke to him, and then he came down, still in a dazed condition. He did not fully recover consciousness until he had been taken home and put to bed. He then had but a dim consciousness of his experience.

All the circumstances indicate that he rose from bed early in the morning, put on his working clothes, took three books under his arm and a long knife used in cutting ferns and started for the woods, where he cut a quantity of ferns and carried them to where he was found by the native. When started by the shout of the latter he still kept his books under his arm and his knife in his hand and climbed the coconut palm to the top, a distance of forty or fifty feet, a difficult feat to perform even to the natives with their hands free.

The boy was never known to walk in his sleep before, but is supposed to have been suffering from nervousness following an attack of fever. One of the most surprising features of the incident is that the boy had never climbed a coconut palm before.

Novel Jungle Fashion.

According to the Electrical World, telegraph wire belts have recently been added to the costume of fashionable east African belles. The telegraph authorities discovered the new fashion. They found great difficulty in maintaining lines through the forests. One of their society reporters, technically known as a lineman, while "covering" a native lawn fete in the jungle noted the new fashion and upon questioning some of the social leaders was informed that it was the custom for the young men to present their partners with these belts as trophies. Now the company has made the tribal chiefs responsible for the telegraph lines in their territory, and the young chiefs have to buy the belts at so much per pound.

The music "Hiawatha" has arrived in Manila, Philippine Islands, according to Homer Cunningham, a Hiawatha (Kaa) boy who is in the United States secret service there, says the Kansas City Times.
