UNKNOWN GIRL DROWNED.

Stepped From a Train and Fell in St. John's River Through Mistake.

St. Albans, April 21.—A peculiarly sad accident occurred on the evening of the 19th inst. on the Canada Atlantic railway, when a young and pretty immigrant girl lost her life as the train was crossing the St. John's river just below LaPlatte, P. Q.

The girl apparently thought that she was being carried past the station and gathering her few belongings together, hurried to the platform and leaped to her death in the icy waters.

AN ENGINEERING FEAT.

F. T. Cutler Moving a 75-ton Boulder at Syracuse, N. Y.

F. T. Cutler, of the firm of McDonald, Cutler & Co., is in Syracuse, N. Y., superintending a job of engineering that has for several months past afforded the people of that city a topic of speculation.

Mr. Cutler went there late in January, looked the situation over and set to work before an audience of some 1,500 people, who said that the stone could not be moved.

It was the shape of an egg ten feet wide, fifteen feet long and eight feet thick.

About one-half of it was buried in the ground and it weighed about 75 tons.

Mr. Cutler had his men dig a trench on one side to the bottom of the stone, and then with steel jacks rolled it out of the hole on to a giant sled made of heavy oak beams.

Then he hitched on the crabs and pulleys, and with a team of 44 horses, drew the great boulder from the pasture nearly a mile to the firm macadam road, where it now stands.

Mr. Cutler has caused to be made by the Lane Manufacturing company, a set of heavy steel rollers, and the remaining five miles of the transportation will be on the same plan as a house moving.

The city officials have delayed the replacing of a stone arch bridge for the accommodation of Mr. Cutler, and some time this month this unique monument of nature's handiwork will rest in Oakwood cemetery.

Its only mark will be the name "Crouse" set in snail letters on the side. From an engineering standpoint it is not strange that the feat set the people to thinking.

FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT

Dr. Mead made a speech thanking the voters for their efforts in behalf of the candidacy of Mr. Manning, and in the course of his speech he formally announced his candidacy for the second place on the republican ticket.

It is understood that the Mead forces will begin work at once in the direction of having delegates elected from the various towns in this part of the state to the state gubernatorial convention who will be favorable to the candidacy of Dr. Mead for the lieutenant governorship.
