**JAPAN'S FIRST ADVANTAGE ON LAND.**

So far as one is able to determine from the somewhat meagre reports that have come from the seat of war, the Japanese were successful in the first great encounter on land, between the Russians and the Japanese, and at the start have belied the generally accepted assertion that the Russians would have the war all their own way on land. After the severe beatings that were administered to the Russians on sea, the followers of the course of the war began a speculation as to the Japanese chances on land, and one and all concluded that the doughty fighter of the far east would meet more than his equal when the land forces lined up for the real test of the merits of the armies. Desultory fighting there has been on land for weeks, but the first battle took place last Tuesday. From the various despatches that have been received, the indications are that the boasted superiority of the czar on land has turned out to be nothing but a boast. Even Russian despatches admit that the Japanese have crossed the Yalu in detached sections. Others say that they were successful against great odds. The results must be that the Japanese will be helped by the advantage which was theirs in the first clash and that the land part of the war will be prosecuted with added vigor. If the reports received are reliable, it should mean the beginning of the end of the war, although Russia, with her vast resources, will be able to prolong the war for some time.
