

TO PUNISH MOROS.

Wood Sends Troops After Bodies of Ambushed Americans.

Washington, May 13.—The war department has received from General Wade, commanding the United States troops in the Philippines, the following cable report of the ambushing of a detachment of Company F, Seventeenth Infantry, in Mindanao, dated Manila:

"While on a reconnaissance to locate Datto Ali, who had been sending in threatening messages and trying to stir up trouble, a detachment of Company F, Seventeenth Infantry, consisting of thirty-nine enlisted men, was attacked by Moros near Lake Liguasan, Mindanao, on the 8th inst. First Lieutenant Harry A. Woodruff, Second Lieutenant Joseph H. Hall and fifteen enlisted men were killed and five enlisted men wounded. The names of the killed and wounded will be reported by cable later. General Wood has ordered troops to proceed and recover bodies and arms of our killed and to punish the offenders. No further details have been received."

Sun Worshiper Declared Insane.

Chicago, May 13.—Crying incoherently that her name was Minnesota and she was in the cathedral of St. Paul, Miss Emma Reusse, a member of the so-called sun worship cult here, has been declared insane. The young woman will be taken to the state hospital at Elgin. Mrs. John Trudup of St. Paul, a half sister of the patient, was the principal witness at the hearing. In testifying Mrs. Trudup declared that the condition of her half sister was caused by weeks of excessive fasting. The witness said Miss Reusse had been in Chicago three years and during that time had been a follower of a sun worship leader.

Miss Anthony Pays Her Taxes.

Rochester, N. Y., May 13.—Miss Mary Anthony has paid her taxes again under protest. She writes to the city treasurer of Rochester: "Once more all women politically classed with minors, criminals, lunatics and idiots are compelled to contribute to the support of a government which denies them any voice in the control of affairs, and once more I pay my taxes under protest. Please so record it." Miss Mary Anthony and her distinguished sister, Susan B. Anthony, never pay taxes with out a protest of this kind.

Pounded to Death in Prize Ring.

Fresno, Cal., May 13.—In a ten round preliminary before the Central California Athletic club Johnny Bryant was pounded into insensibility by Walter Robinson, a negro, and received injuries from which he died in a few hours. The fight ended in the ninth round, in which Bryant was floored six times. His seconds had thrown the sponge into the ring when the blow on the jaw that rendered Bryant unconscious was struck. Robinson has been arrested.

Fair Will Contest Dropped.

New York, May 13.—For the second time the relatives of Mrs. Caroline Nelson Fair, who, with her husband, Charles L. Fair, was killed in an automobile accident in France in 1902, have agreed to waive all claim to Mrs. Fair's estate and to accept a "substantial sum" in consideration thereof. It is understood that the amount received is \$700,000.
