MAKING FAIR-SIZED GAIN. The results of the spring's work of the city listers, as shown in yesterday's news columns, are satisfactory considering the conditions and give ample reason for belief that the growth of Barre during the past decade will continue. The increase in total property valuation has not been large during the year past, but a gain of over \$100,000, during a period that has been considered poor from the business standpoint is considerable. Not a large amount of large building work was done last year, but the present prospects along that line are much better, with several substantial structures under process of building. With an increase in real estate there has been also a small gain in personal property valuation, while the number of taxable polls remains about the same. That there was not the usual increase in polls is due to the fact that in the early spring when business in the granite industry was rather light, a large number of workmen went away temporarily. All things considered the showing for the year is quite good.

Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

There were heavy frosts Thursday in all mountain districts surrounding Rutland. Mercury in that city fell to 39 degrees and much lower temperatures are reported in the country. In Shrewsbury grass was frozen stiff. It is thought fruit and other crops will suffer seriously.

As Roland Scribner of Stratford was out fishing Wednesday afternoon in a stream within sight of the house, he happened to glance behind him and saw a lynx coming toward him from the woods, growling and snarling, his mouth open. The boy waited until the animal got within a few feet of him, and as it crouched to spring, dealt it several blows with his fishing rod, whereupon the lynx turned and ran back into the woods.

Mezar Woodbury of Randolph Center, who will be 90 years old the last of this month, was driving towards South Pleasant street last Saturday forenoon when the horse became frightened at a train and turned so quickly that Mr. Woodbury was thrown out. He was picked up and carried into Dr. A. C. Bailey's office, where it was found that, beyond being bruised and badly shaken, he had suffered no severe injury. After resting an hour or two, he was able to ride home, and the next day felt remarkably well for the victim of such an accident.


