### A 2,000 ACRE LAND DEAL.

Sale of Edmunds Mill Property Lying North of Sherburne.

Beihel, June 14.—One of the largest land deals ever made here in one transaction was closed yesterday when William H. Edmunds entered into an agreement with George Haslett of White River Junction for the sale of Mr. Edmunds' mill property and lands. These lands are situated in four towns and all adjoin each other. The larger part of the tract is what is known as "No Town," which is a narrow strip lying north of Sherburne. For many years this strip belonged to no town, and hence its name. About ten years ago the legislature ceded it to Stockbridge. Mr. Edmunds owns the entire part of "No Town," and it is here his mills are situated.

The sale is estimated to cover 2,000 acres situated in Barnard, Stockbridge, Bridgewater and Sherburne. Mr. Edmunds estimates that there are six million feet of timber on the land sold.

#### Figuring Already on the Attendance at First Games.

Some one has figured it out that up to last Saturday McConnell of Troy, Rutland's former shortstop, led the state league in batting with a percentage of 425 in 21 games.

The attendance at the opening game with Burlington at the new grounds of the Inter-City association Saturday, June 25, is confidently set at 3000 by the Montpelier-Barre management. The grounds have been staked out and grand stands and bleachers with a seating capacity of 1700 will be erected.
