The state of Vermont had a balance on hand of \$412,502.89 on June 30 last, an increase of nearly twenty-five thousand over the year previous. The state of Vermont is to be congratulated.

Henry W. Davis, Democratic candidate for vice-president, acted like a "sixteen-year-old" when he visited Judge Parker at Exopus yesterday, at least so the press reports say. It remains to be seen whether he will run like sixty.

Norwich University, the military college of Vermont, is enjoying a healthy growth, so that it has been deemed necessary to purchase and equip a new dormitory. The seating of Charles A. Spooner to the presidency of the institution ought to give a new impetus to the growth.

Barre city gets the largest amount of money from the division of the state school fund of \$15,000, and we risk being called selfish when we say that the city of Barre deserves it. The city is compelled to vote a tax of 80 cents to keep up its public schools in the proper manner, and the expense is heavy. Probably no other city or large town in the state has to put an equal proportion of its receipts into the school department.

A SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE.

The state tax commissioner, J. E. Cushman, has completed his report for the last biennial period, and the figures therein quoted are most gratifying, the total receipts from corporation and collateral inheritance taxes showing a large increase over the report of the same officer two years ago and a still larger gain over that of four years ago. The collateral inheritance tax is considerably less this time than two years ago but much larger than it was four years ago. The receipts from the corporation tax, however, more than make up, so that the net gain of the period, just passed, over the previous one is more than one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. And a glance at the figures of four years ago shows that the net gain in four years is nearly \$325,000.

State Tax Commissioner Cushman is showing himself to be the right man in the right place. The good results of his efforts are evident.

Australian Barley.

Barley is produced in all the Australian states. Victoria produces the most, having had 32,423 acres in that cereal, producing 691,951 bushels, or 17.5 bushels per acre. Tasmania and Queensland produce a higher average per acre, twenty and nineteen bushels respectively.

ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

Cornwall certainly has a clear title to being one of the banner towns in the way of bean raising this season, it being estimated that there are upwards of 100 acres under cultivation in that town.

A carload of fifteen cattle is expected by the White River Beef Co. Thursday, says a White River Junction despatch. The manager of the establishment, which is a branch of Swift & Co.'s business of Chicago, reports that in case the beef packers strike continues any length of time efforts will be made to meet local demands for beef at the cost from native cattle. The beef trade here this week shows a falling off, but pork products continue in demand.

The secretaries of the American Morgan Register Association have been busy for the past week issuing certificates of eligibility for all Morgan horses in this country that are to be exhibited at the St. Louis exposition. Vermont will head the list with twenty-five fancy bred animals, and Kentucky breeders are a close second with twenty animals. Illinois breeders will send about forty animals, but the strain of Morgan blood is not so pronounced in the latter exhibit as in the Vermont and Kentucky bred animals. The management of the exposition has set aside \$4,300 as prizes in the Morgan class, which is stimulating an interest among breeders of this type of horses.
