Confederate Claims.

The war department is paying old Confederate claims at a great rate, says a Washington dispatch to the New York Tribune. Recently congress appropriated \$225,000 for the reimbursement of Confederate soldiers who had lost their horses or side arms on their way home after Lee's surrender. The terms offered by General Grant included the protection of the Confederate soldiers against the loss of their animals or pistols on their way back to their homes. Some of the command in Tennessee and Georgia encountered northern troops who deprived them of their horses and arms. That was in 1865, since which time there has been an annual effort made to have the money value of the property restored to Lee's men. The quartermaster general's office has now paid out \$151,839.70 on account of these claims, and there is likely to be a further appropriation made next session to continue the discharge of the obligation. It is surprising to the authorities that so many of the claimants survive and that so few are represented by heirs.


