#### What Land Yields.

It is estimated that twenty-two acres of land are necessary to sustain one man on fresh meat. The same space of land, if devoted to wheat culture, would feed 42 people; if to oats, 88; potatoes, Indian corn and rice, 176, and if to the plantain or bread tree, over 6,000 people.

#### Peers' Rights.

Old authorities taught that a peer, if he wasted his property so as to be unable to support the dignity, could be degraded by the king. It is now held that degradation can be effected only by vote of his peers.

#### Cocoa and Chocolate.

Cocoa and chocolate are prepared from the nuts by freeing them from the pulp and making them undergo a process similar to malting. They are afterward roasted in a perforated cylinder and are then freed from their husks and made into cocoa or chocolate.

### TRAIN AND TRACK.

Today there are approximately 1,000,000 railroad men in the United States under what amounts to a practical rule of total abstinence.

It seems to be an established fact that a trolley road is about to be built into the Yosemite. This will do away with the seventy-two miles of staging which have hitherto restricted travel to that region.

A new railroad, planned to scale Gray's peak, near Dillon, Colo., will attain a height at least 300 feet greater than the road which climbs Pike's peak. The new road will tap an important mining area, the Georgetown district, and will be a feeder for both the Colorado and Southern and the Denver and Rio Grande railroads.

#### To Test Steel.

The simplest way to tell iron from steel is to pour on the metal a drop of nitric acid and allow it to set for one minute. On rinsing with water a grayish white stain will be seen if the metal is iron; a black one if it is steel.
