#### To Draw For Indian Lands.

Grand Forks, N. D., Aug. 22.—W. A. #### Want Representation in Congress.

Santa Fe, N. M., Aug. 22.—At a conference of the Pueblo Indians held at Santa Fe steps were taken toward securing representation in congress. It also was decided to ask the interior department to look after the Pueblos' interests.

#### Early Epaulets.

#### Warning for Freeman's Meeting, September 6, 1904.
