WAR IN NEW STAGE

Russians Held That Liaoyang Battle Closed First Phase.

EXPECT FIGHT AT MUKDEN

It is Believed That the Japanese Will Attempt to Force a Decisive Conflict There - The Situation as the Russians See It.

Mukden, Oct. 3.—The prolonged activity on both sides, emphasizing a new situation, clearly shows that the battle of Liaoyang was rightfully described as the end of the first stage of the war, making necessary the adoption of new tactics by the Japanese and rehabilitation in order to meet the proved fact that if the Russians are caught in a decisive conflict it must be on their own ground and terms, with their full knowledge. It is therefore supposed that the Japanese are inching, but it is not improbable that the Japanese will engage the Russians close to the Mukden defenses and reattempt here what they failed to do at Liaoyang.

Occasionally wounded men are brought in here, but the fighting is insignificant, and the situation is particularly quiet west of the railway, while traffic on the Mukden-Simulintin highway is about normal. Both sides are observing the strictest neutrality in the case of the Simulintin railway. There are no Japanese importations, and traffic is uninterrupted. One hundred and twenty-four horse cart loads of silver have been sent to Simulintin by the Chinese here, but the natives are recovering confidence, shops are being reopened, and the number of refugees is diminishing on the Simulintin road.

The condition of the Russian army entirely contradicts the late sensational reports.

The aspect of Mukden and its environs is now one of dust and desolation. The natives have fled, and the wooden parts of their houses have been used for firewood.

THE RUSSIAN COMMANDS.

Changes in the Army and Navy Arouse Much Discussion.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 3.—The forthcoming changes in the naval commands have become the subject of widespread discussion. The necessity for the change is generally admitted, but whether Emperor Nicholas will give immediate effect to the reorganization is uncertain. Meanwhile Vice Admiral Avellan requests that a formal denial of the news of his retirement from the ministry of marine be made public.

The numerous friends and supporters of General Kuropatkin declare that events justify their prediction that he after all will be appointed chief in command of the armies in the far east and that the emperor has reconsidered his intention of sending out Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasievitch as commander in chief. According to their version, the first army will be placed under command of General Lubovitch, now commanding the Ninth army corps at Kiev, and the third army under Lieutenant General Lincvitch.

Quarters are being prepared at the Winter palace for Viceroy Alexeiev, upon whom the emperor intends to bestow a mark of signal honor to prove that his return in nowise is in the nature of a disgrace. Alexeiev will be received with pomp befitting the rank of viceroy, which he will continue to hold during his term of residence here. The report of his appointment as minister of foreign affairs is true in substance if not in form, as he will undoubtedly be consulted on matters of foreign policy affecting the far east. It is considered quite possible that when the war is over Alexeiev will return to the far east in his former capacity.

French War Attache Lost.

Paris, Oct. 3.—The French officials have given up all hope of finding Lieutenant de Cuverville, the military attache, who appears to have left Port Arthur about the middle of August. Complete mystery surrounds his disappearance and leads to fantastic stories charging the Japanese with slinking the junk on which he left Port Arthur for the alleged purpose of capturing secret papers which he was carrying for the Russians. The family of the lieutenant are inclined to support the view of Japanese complicity in his disappearance, but the officials declare there are no facts to warrant suspicious of treachery.

Great Fire in Sevastopol.

London, Oct. 3.—A dispatch to a news agency here from Sevastopol says that the artillery and ammunition magazines there are in flames, and it is feared there has been considerable loss of life.

Emperors Not to Meet.

Berlin, Oct. 3.—The revived report that Emperor William will meet Emperor Nicholas while the latter is at Skierniewice, Poland, on his hunting trip is officially denied.

Franco-German Agreement.

Paris, Oct. 3.—The movement in favor of a Franco-German agreement is beginning to assume a practical aspect. At a recent meeting of socialist leaders at Carmaux resolutions were drawn up by M. Jaures and adopted strongly urging the government to bring about an early reconciliation between the two countries.

Great Damage Done by Forest Fires.

Missoula, Mont., Oct. 1.—Reports from the Clearwater country indicate that the havoc wrought by the recent forest fires in that district are greater than was at first supposed. Considerable timber and nine persons were destroyed. Deer, bear and other game, driven from their haunts in the mountains by smoke and fire, were suffocated, and hundreds of their carcasses are strewn in the valleys.

New Pennsylvania Postmasters.

DAVIS ON THE ISSUES

Democratic Vice Presidential Candidate Presents His Views.

HIS LETTER OF ACCEPTANCE

Imperialism, the Tariff, the Trusts and Other Questions Discussed—Views on the Race Issue—Judge Parker is Eulogized.

Elkins, W. Va., Oct. 3.—Henry G. Davis, candidate of the Democratic party for the office of vice president of the United States, has issued his letter of acceptance of the nomination. The letter is in part as follows:

The times are propitious for the reinstatement of the Democratic party in control of the government. The public mind is being disillusioned of the pretensions of the Republican party, so long and so arrogantly made, that the material prosperity of the country depends upon its own ascendancy. Thoughtful and patriotic people are becoming more and more distrustful of the heady and personal element of the present administration and are more than willing to see it replaced by one that better recognizes constitutional and other lawful restraints. They demand that the present wasteful extravagance in the expenditure of the money, drawn by taxation from the industry of the people, shall cease and that economy and honesty in the public service shall be again regarded as virtues in the high places of the government.

Expenses of Government. The expenditures per capita of the government are increasing at an alarming rate. When the present administration went into power there was a large surplus, but notwithstanding the enormous taxation, the revenues therefrom are not now adequate to meet the demands made by reckless appropriations. The cost of government during the fiscal year was \$2.34 per capita, which means that the average tax paid in some form or another by every family of five persons toward the support of the national administration of public affairs was over \$2, which, in the case of wage earners, is a considerable percentage of their entire earnings for the year.

Imperialism.

We all hail as the harbinger of the new era in the commerce of the world the inception of the great work of building the canal that is to join the two great oceans, but we deprecate the action of the present administration, which inflicted a wound upon our national honor by its disregard of the rights of a weaker nation in order to gain a doubtful credit for its factories, to the forcing of that great enterprise. Territory of a neighboring republic, with which we are at peace, was seized by a band of revolutionists, protected by the guns of the United States navy, and created into a state overnight, which the president promptly recognized as an independent nation—a gross offense against a friendly republic which it was helpless to resent.

Tariff.

That many of the existing tariff rates are excessive and enable powerful combinations to extort unjust and oppressive tribute from the people cannot be controverted. The tariff is undoubtedly too high upon such articles as enables the manufacturer to sell his products abroad cheaper than at home. The average selling price of a hundred articles, taken principally from the iron and steel list, is found to be about 30 per cent higher in this country than abroad. Relief from these conditions will only come through the success of the Democratic party, which stands for a wise, conservative and gradual change in the tariff laws which would realize the benefits of taxation and make honest competition possible. But in making such changes its purpose will be to legislate with a due regard for the labor and capital involved in industrial enterprises.

Race Issue.

It is estimated there are in the United States between two and three hundred combinations of capital and corporate interests, known as trusts, which have grown up in the last few years under Republican rule.
