The report of the finance committee regarding Montpelier's debt is subjoined: \$40,000, funding, due April 1, 1910, optional 1904, city sold to National Life on 3.10 basis, city pays 3 per cent; \$11,500, street improvement, due Aug. 2, 1917, optional 1902, sold to National Life on 3.45 basis at 4 per cent; \$17,500, funding, due Aug. 2, 1917, optional 1907, sold to National Life on 3.45 basis, at 4 per cent; \$2,000, bridge, due Aug. 2, 1917, optional 1902, sold to National Life on 3.45 basis at 4 per cent; \$15,000, bridge, due Nov. 15, 1920, optional 1910, sold to National Life on 3.20 basis at 3 1/2 per cent; \$30,000 school, due Nov. 15, 1920, optional 1910, on 3.20 basis at 3 1/2 per cent; total \$115,000 held by the National Life. For the \$17,500, \$104.61 per \$100 was paid. A temporary loan of \$18,000 made several years ago, due the Capital Savings Bank, is costing the city 4 1/2 per cent.
