The cemetery was established in 1813 and few burials have been made there since 1850. There are 290 stones with names of men prominent in Montpelier at one time. In all there are 301 stones, eleven of which have no inscription. The oldest stone is dated 1791 and several date back of 1800, but these mark the graves of bodies brought here from some other cemetery for final burial.
