William Butler Yeats sent over a member of his own company at the Irish National theater of Dublin to become a member of Miss Margaret Wycherly's company presenting his plays at Chickering hall, Boston. The report that John Hare is to leave the stage is unfounded. He made a pleasant speech of farewell at the end of an engagement in Birmingham, England, and somehow it was construed as a leave taking of the stage. One of the clever impersonations in George Ade's quaint comedy, "The County Chairman," is that of the heroine, Lucy Rigby, the daughter of the village autocrat, played by that charming young actress, Frances Ring.

TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

Glass houses of a very substantial kind can be built now. Silesian glass-makers are turning out glass bricks for all sorts of building purposes. At a recent conference of the trade in Leicester, England, the president of the Institute of Carriage Builders said that practically the whole of the wheel making industry of Europe had been captured by America. A vast body of pure white clay has been found four miles east of Boulder, Colo., which makes excellent porcelain. A local clay company will utilize the product in the manufacture of white, cream and granite bricks. Swiss watchmakers have now added a photograph to some of their wonderful watches. A small rubber disk is put in the watch and arranged in such a way that the record is repeated every hour. Anything can be put on the record that the owner wishes.

CITY AND STATE.

Rutland, Vt., has a population of 15,000 or more and is the only city of any size in the United States without a theater. Hitherto San Francisco has prohibited the erection of buildings to a height greater than 201 feet. Now an ordinance has been passed permitting a height of 221 feet. A strong reaction in temperance sentiment in Vermont has taken place. It will manifest itself in the legislature. Forty-four towns which last year voted in favor of license this year voted no license. A student of the population of the anthracite region of Pennsylvania reports that there are 630,000 people inhabiting that section, of whom 430,000 are foreign born. Of this latter number over 50,000 cannot read or write. THRONE LIGHTS. The sultan of Turkey has seventy-one titles. King Frederick Augustus of Saxony, on his ascension to the throne, proclaimed an amnesty for all minor offenses except that of cruelty to animals. It is said that the emperor of Austria has had more hard luck during his fifty-six years' reign than any other monarch. He has lost every battle he has fought, his wife was assassinated, and his oldest son committed suicide. The insignia of the Order of the Garter belonging to the late Duke of Cambridge, which was sold to Mr. Marx, a jeweler of Homburg, for £1,100, has been resold by him to the German emperor for £1,300 and is to be added to the Prussian crown jewels.

GOWN GOSSIP.

White chiffon velvet makes ideal wedding dresses. A pretty wreath for the hair is made of light green grape leaves, with miniature bunches of white grapes. Changeable effects are found in every material, from velvet to chiffon, and have even invaded the cloths for tailor made costumes. New leather belts show the influence of tucks and shirring, for the soft leathers and suedes are puckered in tiny folds in just the appearance of shirring. A pretty and sensible fashion of the winter will be the trimming of walking suits with fur. Ermine will be used as a lining, and revers and cuffs will be bordered with mink or other short haired skins.--New York Tribune.
