ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

There is an unusual and almost alarming shortage in the water supply at Charlotte and vicinity. Numerous wells and cisterns have failed where a shortage has never before been experienced.

Dr. John A. Mead of Rutland has declined the appointment which he recently received from Gov. C. J. Bell as one of the delegates from Vermont to the national convention of state sealers.

Charles E. Crane has resigned his position in The Associated Press office in Boston, and January 1 will go to Brattleboro to assist his brother, E. H. Crane, in the management of The Reformer.

William Spence of Burlington was taken yesterday to the Mary Fletcher hospital, suffering from injuries received from a kick from a horse on Saturday. The animal kicked him in the left arm, breaking a small bone in the elbow and badly bruising the arm.

Station Agent Frank H. Wheeler of St. Johnsbury Center is circulating a petition which is meeting with approval, to change the name of that village to Riverdale. Considerable interest is being shown by express and freight carriers for that station being left at St. Johnsbury, and it is hoped a change in the name will avoid such annoyance and consequent delay.

Sheriff Smith arrested and placed in the county jail Mr. Downing of Pantou on a charge of stealing \$92 from the residence of L. G. Kent, for whom he worked. Mr. Kent received the money on a debt and in the presence of Downing placed it in his account book and laid the book in his desk. When he went to get the money to send to the bank it was missing. Downing was arrested and denied the theft but gave up over \$90 that he alleged he saved himself from his wages. On examination he was held for the grand jury under \$300 bonds, which he could not furnish.

December is colder thus far than December, 1903, which was the coldest December experienced here in 17 years. The mercury then fell to zero in this city on the 15th and on the 27th and 29th, says the Burlington Free Press. The average for the month was five degrees colder than the average of the 20 years previous. This month the first zero weather came on the 10th; the thermometer fell to two or three below zero yesterday morning, and temperatures of minus 10 and 12 degrees have been quoted in some Vermont towns in the first third of the month. If it keeps on in this fashion the month will break the record for cold.

A meeting of the centennial fund committee of the Associate Alumni of the University of Vermont was held at the office of Darwin P. Kingsley, vice president of the New York Life Insurance Co., Saturday morning at eleven o'clock. There were present Messrs. Charles A. Catlin of Providence, R. I., chairman; Darwin P. Kingsley and Horatio Loomis of New York City, Dr. F. T. Kidder of Woodstock, President Bushman, Elias Lyman and Professor Howes of Burlington. The officers were re-elected for the coming year. C. A. Catlin, chairman; Professor Howes, secretary; Elias Lyman, executive committee; President Bushman, Treasurer; E. H. Powell and Professor Howes, advisory committee. Eugene N. Foss of Boston was elected a member of the committee. Plans were formed for the work of this year.

Though Surveyor George Bond of Searsburgh is headed for the 70 year mark and has perhaps spent more time in the woods of Vermont than any man in the state, he strangely enough had never seen a bear in its native wilds until last Thursday. On that day he was surveying in the Somerset woods. He was squinting through his transit, trying to locate the pole held by his assistant a number of rods away, when there appeared in his line of vision a bruising big bear.
