Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

Senator William P. Dillingham was a guest Wednesday evening at a dinner given by Senator and Mrs. Joseph B. Foraker of Ohio, at their home in Washington.

Dr. A. C. Bailey, who has been health officer for the town of Randolph for the past eighteen years, has completed his duties in that capacity and his successor is to be Dr. J. P. Guifford.

There is a report in Pownal that William B. Harris, Sr., was frozen to death on Stamford mountain Sunday morning, December 11. Mr. Harris has five children living in Pownal.

Philip Carpenter, who is lawyer for Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick, held under \$15,000 on the charge of aiding and abetting bank officials in the embezzlement of \$13,500,000, is a graduate of St. Johnsbury Academy and a nephew of the Hon. Jonathan Ross.

Ex-Judge H. Henry Powers of Morrisville is the possessor of one of the original Rutland & Burlington baggage checks in use upwards of fifty years ago, and of which only four are known to be in existence, these having been recently discovered by one of the conductors among the rubbish in the ruins of the old Rutland depot. Judge Powers' prize, numbered 9900, and nicely polished, adorn his grip.

Going without a mouthful of anything to eat for two days and two nights in this land of wealth and plenty, and not having a place to sleep for two nights, being compelled to walk the streets of Burlington in zero weather, seems hardly credible, but such was the experience of John Lamotte, according to his story. Lamotte claims that he walked the streets Monday and Tuesday nights, and also says that from Tuesday until Thursday he did not have anything to eat. Yesterday he appeared in the north part of the city, and was the object of a good deal of curiosity, as his story was so unusual and extraordinary.

Luther Putnam, an enterprising farmer of Cambridge, has gathered over 3,000 bushels of apples the past season and has marketed over 1,000 bushels. He has fed and put in storage more than 2,000 bushels. His leading variety is the Wealthy, the others in order are the Fameuse, McIntosh Red, McMahon White, Northern Spy, and most of the hardy standards, with also many of the newer varieties. Mr. Putnam has spared no pains with his orchard of 2,500 trees to propagate the best standard and novelty varieties and is improving his orchard by grafting only the best varieties. He has also large plum and pear orchards but the crop of these varieties was light the past season.

A Filipino Thief. John Henry Davis, a Filipino, is confined in the Chittenden county jail, being held as a United States prisoner. Davis has been working at Fort Ethan Allen for Lieut. Warren Dean, 15th cavalry, and Thursday afternoon, the lieutenant, who had been watching his movements, accused him of stealing some of his clothes and disposing of it to the men of the 23rd battery. Davis confessed to the charge and was sent to jail in this city in charge of Sergeant Gifford, Troop C, 15th cavalry.
