ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

In the class day officers chosen for commencement by the senior class of Williams college, Williamstown, Mass., Arvie Eldred, of North Pownal, was chosen historian.

Former Gov. John L. Bates, of Massachusetts, will resume his regular law practice in Boston February 1 with H. H. Armstrong. Mr. Armstrong is a former resident of Bakersfield and Enosburgh Falls.

The Rev. Edward Newell has received a call to the pastorate of a church in New York, where he formerly preached eight years, but the Free Baptist church at Lyndon Center, of which he is pastor, has promised to increase his salary if he will remain there.

Mrs. Emeline H. Bailey, of Peacham, celebrated her 90th birthday anniversary recently in a very quiet way, receiving several calls from her friends in town and letters of congratulation from far and near. She is in very good health for a person of her age.

The condition of Newell Ellsworth, of Morrisville, who has been critically ill since the middle of December from the effects of arsenical poisoning administered by his wife while temporarily insane, is slightly improved and he is now able to sit up a short time each day.

John Ryan, of Plainfield, has in his possession four letters, the dates of which range from 1800 to 1849, written to Miss Helen Hitchcock. All the letters were written before envelopes or stamps were used and the postage to be collected was marked on the wrapper, the cost on these being from five to fifteen cents.

H. H. Powers of Morrisville has been recommissioned as counsel for the Rutland road, and will continue to retain his position, although the road has passed into the hands of the New York Central. Mr. Powers says the old staff of officials would remain the same. The treasurer's office will be moved to Rutland soon and all the affairs of the road will be directed from the Rutland office.

The new school-house at Lyndonville was opened for inspection last Saturday. The building is a two-story one, 72x50 feet, with granite trimmings and a substantial granite foundation. There is a handsome granite arch over the front entrance, bearing the inscription, "Lyndonville Graded School." Everything is up-to-date and thoroughly equipped. From the rear the pupils can go out into the large play ground of an acre and a half, enclosed by a fence and reaching to the river. The cost has been about \$30,500. The school was opened January 23, with the following board of teachers: Gleason D. Young, principal; Miss Sadie Houghton, Miss Susan Cunningham, Mrs. Nantle Rogan, Miss Edith Rainey and Miss Beryl Harrington.

Baptist State Missionaries.
Among the missionaries who have been engaged by the Vermont Baptist State Convention to do evangelistic work among the Baptist churches of this state are the Rev. L. O. F. Cote, whose headquarters are at Burlington, and Miss Amy Haskins, Sunday-school visitor and personal worker, whose headquarters will be at Montpelier, who will assist the Rev. Gibbs Braislin, pastor of the church at Rutland, for an indefinite period. Among the other missionaries who are at present in the employ of the convention are the Rev. A. B. Belloni, an Italian missionary, who is working among the Italians at Barre; and the Rev. Andrew Kallgreen, a Swedish missionary, who is working at Barre and Montpelier. Mr. Belloni was the man selected to speak on the Italian missionary work at the St. Louis exposition.

RECENT INVENTIONS.

Herr Becker of Berlin has invented an absolutely reliable mechanical time fuse for big guns. The Messrs. Krupp have bought the patent.

A German has invented a microphone for suspension in the water in order to record on a connected telephone the presence of shoals of fish, which by their tapping on the microphone case will betray themselves.

C. A. Parsons, now famous as the inventor of the turbine, which is revolutionizing the steamship, has recently amused himself by devising a valve called the auxotophane which promises similarly to advance the phonograph, which it endows with extraordinary power and purity of tone.

Berlin university has more students than any other university in the world, 7774 at present attending lectures.

In some of the London schools the boys as well as the girls take lessons in cooking in view of the possible usefulness of such knowledge to soldiers, sailors or colonists.

Longfellow's "Evangeline" has been banished from the British Columbia schools. The reasons given are that the poem is tainted with an anti-British spirit and it is becoming stale to the teachers from long use.

IBSEN'S MASTERPIECE.

From the Atlantic to the Pacific; from Maine to Texas, the critical theatre goer has felt the mediocrity of the modern moral play. That the majority of so called problem plays are weak, lacking in their entertaining qualities, is evidenced by their short lives. "Ghosts," the stirring masterpiece of the Norwegian dramatist genius, is not only powerful to the extent of having actually caused strong men to cry out, but only holds the audience in such spellbound attention that after the fall of the final curtain scarcely a person moves until the ushers throw open the exit doors. From the first production of "Ghosts" this season the immense audience has demonstrated its popularity. Yet it is not the play alone which has won success. Claus Bogel and Adelaide Fitz Allen and their gifted company portray the subtle force of Ibsen's domestic tragedy with such excellence that as characterized by an eminent New York critic: "One forgets one is in a theatre and that the people who move before him are actors."

This wonderful play will be at the Barre Opera House Saturday, February 11th.

STATE LINES.

A Louisville paper states that there are two divorced women for every divorced man in Kentucky.

At the recent election the people of California voted in favor of a state constitutional amendment exempting from taxation \$100 worth of personal property.

Missouri has more live stock farmers than any other state in the Union. Its live stock is worth \$200,000,000. While it has only 4 1/2 per cent of the live stock of the country, it has 5 per cent of the total value of live stock in the United States.

A recently published report shows Maine to have gained \$6,718,280 in wealth during the year just ended. The value of sheep and shipping has decreased. Taxes are generally higher all over the state, but 174 towns are entirely free from debt.
